Cold spell delays bass spawning

Despite the early arrival of spring this year, a cold spell held off most normal activities.

Trees, flowers, are all late and the ice is just out in places such as Sauble Beach and rivers such as the Moon.

This will delay the BASS spawning, so take note when fishing for other species. Release all Bass and try not to fish in areas where Bass spawn.

Gravel shallows or indents in the shoreline are prime areas. Bass nests are highly visible and you can help Bass fishing by not disturbing their nuptial homes. Smallmouth bass spawn when the water temperature is 15.6-16 C and Largemouth at 20 C.

They could still be spawning when the Bass season opens June 19 or 26 depending on where you fish. For those persons fishing the area known as Scotch Block near Milton, the season is closed. Not only that but the whole area is closed. There is no parking anywhere near the lake, the parking lots are closed, and no boats or canoes will be allowed on the lake. You can fish from the road only, but you will have to walk a long way to get there. This is all because of your "bush party" friends and those vandals who insist on tearing up that particular area.

PIKE OPEN

The pike season is open here, and some good pike are being taken in Fairy Lake at Acton. Just remember to avoid the Bass and carefully release those you catch as incidental.

Pike are shallow as the water is not too warm yet. Try fishing for them with a streamer fly for top flight excitement.

A field trail for top quality dogs will be held June 5 and 6 at Kendall Hills farm, Oroon, Ontario. The host club, N.A.V.H.D.A., Ontario Chapter is under the direction of Karl Kelenberg at (416) 677-1197.

This trail will be held under the rules of the U.S. National Shoot-To-Retrieve Association.

FISH CONTEST

The Ontario Federation of Anglers and Hunters big fish contest is set for another big season. Last year saw some big fish and this year could be the best.

Early spring and late fall are the times when the best fish are entered, but there are always lots taken in the summer fishery. Get a copy of the entry form and get set to win some great prizes.

The contest runs from April 24 to November 30, and forms may be obtained from OFAH at Box 28, Peterborough, Ont. K9J 6Y5. At the same time, if you are not a member, send them your name, address and phone number and indicate you wish to join. They will bill you or send you the correct forms for that purpose.

Burns Nature area is run by the Halton Region Conservation Authority, their trout Derby is June 5 and 6. There are always lots of fish, some very big. The Bass Derby runs June 26 and 27, July 3 and 4 and July 10 and 11.

The Bass Derby is at Mountsberg Wildlife Centre. The ponds at Terra Cotta and Belfountain are not stocked yet.

The last information I received was Belfountain was, but this is not the case. It will be stocked some time in the next two weeks, and Terra Cotta two or three weeks after that.

This is unfortunate but they claim the MNR has no fish. They should buy private if that is the case.

Colgate promises to be the largest and the best

In all likelihood the fifth edition of the Colgate Women's Games to be held at Etobicoke's Centennial Stadium in Toronto on June 19-20, 1982 will be the largest and the most competitive yet.

All aspiring entrants should take special notice of the entry deadline of May 31. To be eligible, all entries must be postmarked no later than that date.

The track and field competition is open to all females ten years of age and over as of December 31, 1982 and is an excellent bargain for there is no entry fee and all participants receive a free T-shirt.

Sponsored by Colgate-Palmolive Canada, the Colgate Women's Games have grown in each of their previous four years. Entries have risen from 900 in 1978 to over 1800 entries last year.

It is fully expected that the Games will once again see an increase in entries this year, thereby fulfilling Colgate's hopes of expansion of the level of participation in track and field in Canada.

The event has become the largest female track and field meet in the country. Although the majority of entries come from within Ontario, entries have been received in past years from across Canada and from the United States and Bermuda as well.

Heading the list of entrants to date is Diane Jones-Konihowski who will be repeating as Mistress of Ceremonies and will be defending her title in the shot put.

Jones-Konihowski has been Canada's premier pentathlete-heptathlete for the last decade and

North Halton golf tips

Last week we talked about aligning yourself to the target, therefore enabling yourself to have a chance to swing down the target line.

Today we are going to discuss the other area of major concern that produces golf shots with undesirable results. The area of concern is tension.

Tension, next to alignment, is the worst destroyer of a potentially effective golf swing. Tension is also a product of misalignment, because of the number of mis-hit shots that have already been produced.

The only sure way of defeating tension is to acquire the ability to align yourself to the target area. Then your concentration is removed from the ball and the target to your body.

Our body is always on the move therefore we must listen to our body to find out where the tension in our swing is developing.

Once we have established where, we must

now concentrate on letting our body feel free and good about our golf swing.

The amateur tends to feel his/her swing to be inadequate therefore trying to develop a golf swing which is not themselves.

Therefore this week while we play or practise work on all your shots, developing the same technique. That is align all your shots - whether it be a three foot putt or a 240 yard tee shot.

Then concentration on the feeling of lightness - not slowness - but the ability to have your body travelling with freedom rather than tension as the club travels down the target line.

Remember, trust yourself and be yourself when you swing the golf club.
