# Schools prepare for a busy summer

The Halton board of education's summer school office staff is busy processing the registrations and finalizing arrangements for the elementary and secondary summer school programs. Last summer, over 900 elementary and 1,000 secondary students took advantage of the program and as

more students and parents become aware of the success and benefits of such programs, enrolment is expected to increase. For the eleventh year, secondary (high school) credit courses will be offered. Included are the "core" subjects required by the Ministry of Education such as Grade 9 and 10 English, Math, Canadian

History and Geography, Science, Grade 11 and 12 English. Other subjects include French, Biology, Chemistry, Physics and most Grade 13 subjects. The secondary program will operate in Oakville at Queen Elizabeth Park School and in Burlington at Lord Elgin High School. Classes start July 6 and end Aug. 13. Classes start

at 8 a.m. and conclude at 12:30 p.m. Students may enrol in new credit subjects, taught for four hours daily. Students may take only one new credit course during the summer because of the heavy work load. Students who have been unsuccessful in their year's work may "make-up to two credits. These courses operate two hours daily.

Students are also invited to register in a summer Driver Education program. The course consists of 25 hours of in-class theory and 18 hours in-car instruction. The 18 hours is broken into 12 hours of observation and six hours "behind the wheel". The fee for this course is \$100. Thirty Grade 11 and 12 students are expected to enrol in a business co-operative credit program. This course is an opportunity to be on the staff of a local business this summer. The experience enables students to apply their business skills in a practical work environment, and, at the same time, to earn a senior secondary school credit.

The co-operative program will operate in all areas of Halton Region. The first week, job orientation week, will be held at Lord Elgin High School in Burlington. Though students should not expect to receive a wage while enrolled in the program, they may be paid according to the policy of the employers. From July 5 to Aug. 6,

summer school courses in language and math will be held for Grades 6, 7 and 8 in middle schools throughout the region. These courses are intended to improve specific weaknesses and build upon strengths of the students. Classes are small (20:1) and therefore students receive much individual attention over the summer. Elementary classes run from 8:30 to 10 a.m. and from 10:30 to noon. A non-refundable fee of \$5 is charged for each course. Parents interested in enrolling their child in summer school should contact their local school.

A non-credit microcomputer course for beginners is being offered at Lord Elgin High School during the summer school session. This course is open to graduates of Grades 7 and 8, with a minimum mark of 75 per cent in math and the recommendation of their math teacher. Students will study the elementary aspects of BASIC programming and will get practice and programming time. Classes commence July 5 and end July 30, for two hours each day. The cost is \$25 for the course, and a fee will be charged for text book use which will be refunded at the end of the course upon return of the book. The English as a second language program for new Canadians, or anyone wishing to improve his or her spoken English, is offered at the elementary, secondary and adult levels this summer. Elementary school children may enrol in classes held at Oakwood School in Oakville, W.I. Dick Public School in Milton or at Rolling Meadows School in Burlington. Classes will be held from July 5 to Aug. 6, from 9 to noon. Secondary School students may take English as a second language at Lord Elgin High School in Burlington, from July 5 to Aug. 6. These classes are also held in the mornings for three hours. Adult classes will be formed where sufficient registrations are received. These classes will be conducted at the secondary school sites, from July 5 to Aug. 6. Prospective students are asked to call the summer school office at 335-3663, 827-8403 or 878-8451. Registrations are taken on a first-come, first-served basis, so register early. Don't be disappointed!

# Duplicate bridge

Again, from the duplicate game at the Georgetown Bridge Club, comes today's hand. East's hand does not look like it could ever be interested in a spade contract, but if East listens carefully to partner's bidding, and realizes that his minor suit holding is important, East should raise to 4 spades when partner jumps in this suit.

opponents to knock out both top diamonds before dislodging the club A, he may go down. The three no trump bidders in the east-west should be unhappy with this hand as the eight card fit in spades produces a 420 score and 3 NT, if it is made, scores only 400.

3NT cannot be considered by East because of his heart holding. Although 3 NT will play, it will be beaten by 4 spades 70 per cent of the time. Only a defensive "faux-pas" will promote 3 NT to a good score and one cannot plan on that. This was the hand:

**THE ANALYSIS:**  
4 S is the optimum contract for E-W, easily reached by E-pass, W-1S, E-2C, W-3S, E-4S. The spade game is possible, even with the bad trumps break, so long as declarer recognizes the necessity of knocking out the club A early.

If North leads the D-Q, for example, West should win in his hand and lead the club J. South can win and return a diamond, but declarer can then dump his red-suit losers on the club K plus Q. After this, declarer draw trump losing only 2 spades and a club. Note that if West allows the
