**Writer's objectivity challenged
as Witnesses defend their beliefs**

To the editor of The Herald:

We do not intend to carry on a campaign of letter writing on the matter, but we will make this last response to what has followed my recent letter. The vigor and length of the replies May 19 only substantiate what was said in my letter.

Bob Ollivier's explanation for his not asking us for information is additional evidence he has a problem in writing objectively about us. Had he taken the time to come to see us he would have found our information booth at our main gate to be a thoughtful convenience for our visitors, aiding them to get directions to the right locations in our complex. If the information booth bothered him that much he could easily have telephoned us.

The degree of his feelings also show up in his reaction to our printing the New World Translation of the Holy Scriptures. We also print the King James Version, the American Standard Version and other

translations. The weakness of any objection to our making a translation of the Bible is seen in the fact that we existed and flourished in our modern history for 80 years before

producing such a translation. As to its value, Eerdman's Handbook to the Bible lists it among the 14 "main 20th-century English translations." Bible translator Edgar J. Good-

speed says of it: "It exhibits a vast array of sound serious learning, as I can testify."

The other letter is mostly a reprint of portions of an anti-Witness pamphlet

and is not original. The points raised have been adequately answered in our publications. Those who sincerely wish information on this matter usually ask us when we call at their homes.

Our invitation to Bob Ollivier remains. We hope he will yet be kind enough to visit us here. It is our hope that such a visit will result in his attitude toward us being as warm and generous as has been the general reaction of Georgetown to our moving here.
