Hoogaars hope for local interest in BMX track

With the availability of a "bit of hilly property", appropriate zoning authorization, a buildozer, helpful sponsors and volunteers, the Hoogaars family is hoping Georgetown can support a Moto-cross dirt track for bicycles.

Mary Hoogaars, whose two sons Tim. 10 and Mike, 4 have raced their specially-made BMX (Blcycle Motocross) cycles against international competitors, would like to see a local track here in town.

Hoogaars spent some time last week on the phone sollciting support from local businesses as sponsors to her new proposal. She has approached Foberts Real Estate who have offered to see if they might help with finding the land that is required.

As a concerned parent, Mary Hoogaars says her initiative to organize a BMX track (which would include a 700 yard winding course) is to provide a "safe place to ride bikes".

She realizes that sidewalks and street corners are hardly the place for youngsters to be testing out the maneuverability of the \$140 speciallyreinforced bicycles.

SAFESPORT But are the jumps and hairpin

turns of a typical BMX course safe, a parent may ask? "Yes," says Mary Hoogaars. "I can honestly say it's safer for them than playing hockey."

The riders are protected with clothing plus the required helmets for track riding. They "just fall off the bike and roll," Hoogaars says. Usually first aid volunteers are on the sidelines, she says.

The sport of BMX racing is reported to have started after a movie called "Any Sunday" showed kids on bicycles imitating the real moto-cross motorcycles at the side of the track.

In 1972 the United States held the first American National championships which had 15,000 spectators. Canada will be holding their first national championships in bleycle moto-cross this year.

Newmarket has a BMX track while Milton just opened up a new track last week and hopes to sponsor a Can-Am race in July for three days. REPAIR SHOP

Hoogaars says she and her husband would like to establish a BMX repair shop in Georgetown to complement the Moto-cross track they hope to construct. Mary's husband Peter was a major organizer in Holland of BMX races, she says.

Hoogaars would like to see a body of volunteers respond to help the area youngsters get a moto-cross track started. She says Joy Gwillam of the Recreation Department will meet with her to see if the town can assist.

Some grandfathers compete in BMX races, for prizes for as much as \$1,000, Hoogaars says. With youngsters starting at age four and five, the moto-cross sport is truly a family sport, she says.

Tim Hoogaars has won the French, Dutch and British national BMX championships since he started racing two years ago. His parents moved from Arizona to Holland before arriving in Georgetown recently. Tim has also won the Can-Am championship at Ningara Falls.
