# A swallow's nesting shelf

Since the arrival of European man in North America, a few birds have taken readily to our structures to improve their habitat. One of these is the barn swallow, the fork-tailed swallow which swoops and zooms around the homestead to capture insects on the wing.

Originally restricted to rock crevices and overhanging cliffs, these swallows have made good use of barns and garages as supports for their mud and grass nests. Some have even been seen nesting on slow moving boats and trains, which must surely be unique to this species.

Sometimes, however, barn swallows insist on nesting in locations that are inconvenient to the homeowners, or where their droppings create a nuisance. Often people who would like a pair of chattering swallows as a neighbor have trouble attracting the birds to nest. Now a naturalist from Del Rio, Texas, has come up with a shelf design which seems to meet the demanding specifications of these flying flyers, and should help a pair of swallows find a home where it suits you best.

The shelf itself is simple—a piece of wood six to eight inches square with a two-inch wooden rim all

# Queen's Park report

SUNCOR DEBATE  
Debate on a Liberal motion of non-confidence on the government's purchase of \$650 million of 25 per cent of Suncor ended in a vote of 66 to 48 in favor of the government. During the heated debate, the government was strongly criticized for being secretive about the deal and for mismanagement of public funds.

Opposition members insisted that the government should have used the money to counter growing unemployment and to save homes, businesses and farms jeopardized by high interest rates. Liberal Leader David Peterson characterized the purchase as a bad business deal which would not produce one job or one drop of oil for Ontario.

The minister of energy maintained it was a timely and strategic investment. Peterson also said the deal was an example of the government's promiscuous use of the jobs of a majority.

failed to discharge its duty to manage public funds properly and had shown contempt for the Legislature by failing to disclose details of the transaction. The Suncor purchase was also, he said, a bad business deal considering that the company declared a \$78 million dividend the day before the Ontario agreement was finalized and that the company's profits have slumped dramatically.

**HAMILTON WEST BY-ELECTION**  
Premier Davis has announced that a by-election will be held June 17 in the Ontario riding vacated by former provincial Liberal leader Stuart Smith. This will be the first by-election since both Ontario Opposition parties acquired new leaders this spring. The Liberal candidate will be Joe Barbera of Firestone Canada. Candidates for the other two parties are Bob McMurrich, school board trustee, for the Conservatives and Richard Allen, McMaster history professor, for the NDP.

**ONTARIO HYDRO**  
There has been considerable criticism again recently about the wasteful practices of Ontario Hydro. The Corporation's staff and accommodation have been mushrooming while the amount of electricity it

sees is increasing only slightly. David Peterson has charged that in the past five years, the number of Hydro employees jumped 28 per cent, the amount of office space has increased 39 per cent, but the amount of energy sold has increased only five per cent. He maintained that poor judgement by the Corporation underlines the

need for more government control, and listed some Hydro blunders which are costing consumers billions of dollars. These include a \$500 million overpayment for uranium for nuclear plants, \$400 million to mothball the Wesleyville oil-fired generating plant, \$485 million not to proceed with the Bruce heavy water plant.

Unless noxious weeds are destroyed by June 7, 1982, and as often as necessary throughout the season to prevent the ripening of their seeds and dispersal of their pollen, the Town of Halton Hills may enter private property and destroy these weeds. The costs will be charged against the property owner and collected in the manner of Municipal Taxes.

Goatsbeard, Thistles, Chicory, Poison Ivy, Ragweed, Wild Carrot, and Milkweed are among the weeds considered noxious, and must be destroyed wherever found. Complaints regarding Dan-delon and Goldenrod will not be accepted as these are not considered noxious under the terms of the Weed Control Act. Anonymous complaints will not be accepted.

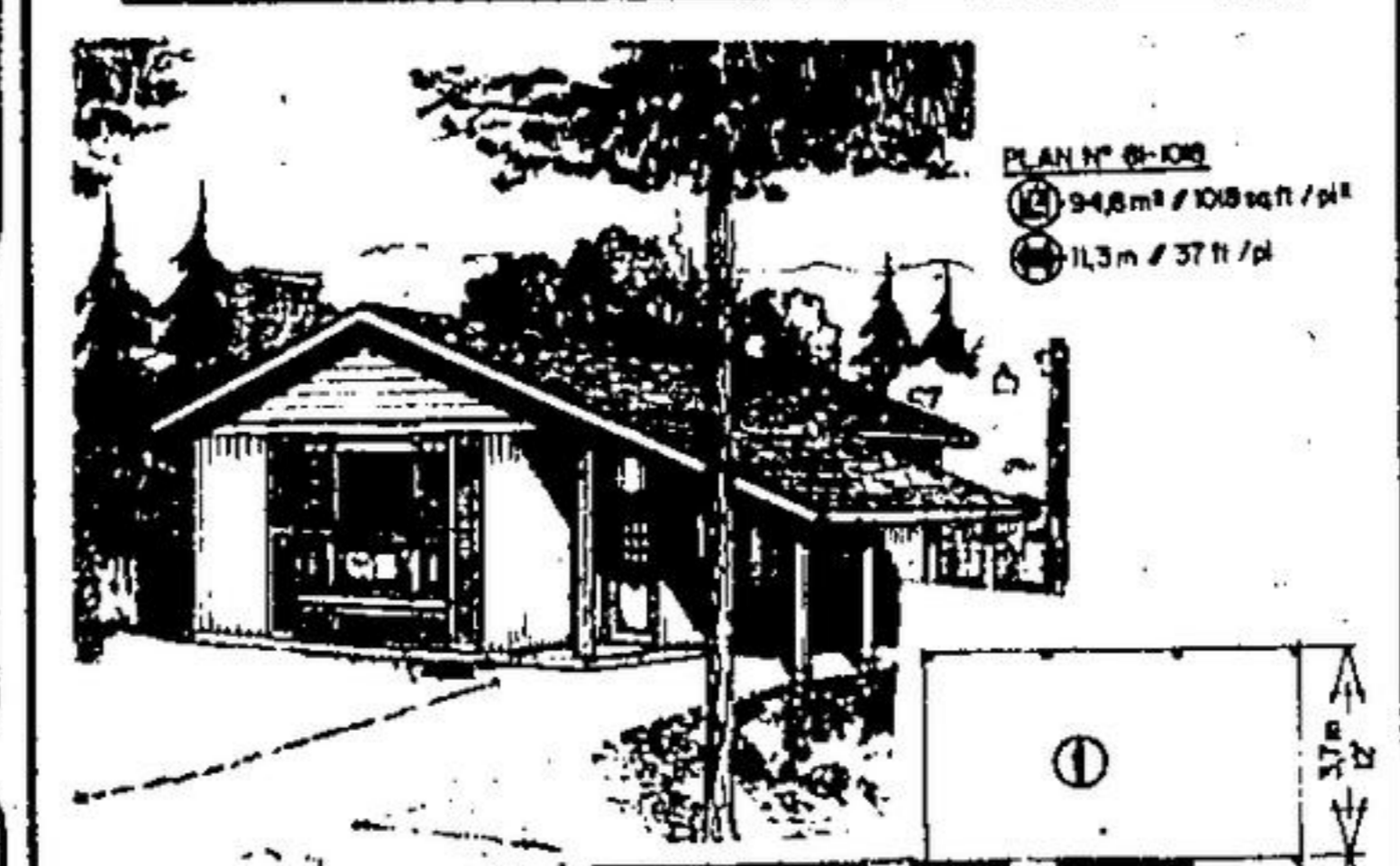
