School awards sexist?

Three awards given out at commencement- exercises at the Georgetown-District High School are given by organizations whose criteria for choosing recipients includes the students' sex.

J.W. Ferguson of Georgetown brought this state of affairs to the Halton board of education's attention Thursday night in a trim piece of correspondence.

"I believe that discrimination such as this is no longer acceptable and I object to the board allowing such organizations and awards to be included in any program in our public school system," Mr. Ferguson wrote. "I ask that the board act to stop this practice and I request a response from an elected member of the board."

Halton Hills trustee Betty Fisher backed Mr. Ferguson's complaints.

"It's against the charter of rights, it's sex discrimination," she said. "Though It's gracious of people to offer those scholarships he (Mr. Ferguson) bélleves there should be no sex discrimination at all," Mrs. Fisher said.

Trustee Anne Fairfield disagreed, saying that schools should accept awards according to the criteria donors have established.


