## BMX bikes hot sellers

Bicycle Moto-cross cycles are outselling 10 speed bikes by about four to one, says North Halton co-proprietor Doug Anderson.

The increase in popularity in the bikes might be because they require less maintenance than 10

speed bikes, Anderson says. Last year the BMX craze had just hit the market and North Halton Sports had to keep re-ordering the bikes as demand increased, he says. This summer, Doug and co-proprietor Chris

Milne had ordered enough to fill the demand. The cheapest BMX bike at North Halton Sports sells at \$170, but many of the youths are buying the expensive BMX bike rather than the low-cost model, Chris Milne says.

A BMX bike costs about the same as a 10 speed, but specially reinforced parts are designed to take hard punishment from riders such as when used for Moto-cross racing where jumps and spills can be common-place.
