The grade 10 student says his mother Valerie and his father Owen have supported him tremendously in his committment to skating.

Darren has also had to make sacrifices such as giving up after-school activities and other sports such as hockey, which he once played.

But as he says, "I wouldn't be skating if I didn't enjoy it all the time." What Darren likes most about skate competitions is the opportunity to travel and meet new people.

Darren is a former member of the Georgetown Figure Skating Club. In the Novice men's freestyle category, Darren is working on his seventh figure of a total of eight required to advance to Junior competitive.

If it wasn't for the ice being taken out for a month, Darren would be practising the entire 12 months, he says. His next competition will be this summer in Thornhill. In the future Darren would like to teach skating after he has finished competing.






