**Duke's award for our Derek**

Georgetown army cadet Derek Murphy of Duncan Drive received the Duke of Edinburgh's Award Silver Certificate of Achievement at a special ceremony at Queen's Park Saturday. Ontario Lieutenant-Governor John Aldred presented the certificate to more than 100 young army, air and sea cadets as well as students and individuals selected for the honor from across the province. The Duke of Edinburgh's Award program challenges young people from 14 to 25 years of age to excel at leisure time activities in public service, journeys of exploration, skills or fitness.

**Bonds bug Otto**

Haltom MP Otto Jelinek continues his attack on what he considers government inaction on the small business bond program, revised by the recent federal budget. The MP asked finance minister Allan Rock recently in the House of Commons whether he would return the program to its original state "so that small businessmen and farmers can take advantage of that bond now when they need it, before it is too late". The minister defended his budget's alterations to the program, noting that recommendations from all parties had been incorporated, and reported that \$100 million has just been allocated to farmers as a result of changes in the bond program.

**Cemetery expansion?**

Faced with a dwindling number of plots in the Roman Catholic section of Greenwood Cemetery, the town's general committee last week agreed to add property to the section. Currently, the Catholic section has three single plots, 84 infant plots and 214 cremation sites remaining and representatives from Holy Cross and Sacre Coeur Churches in Georgetown asked to have the area enlarged. The only other Catholic cemetery in Haltom Hills is Dublin Cemetery near Speyside.

**Duplicate bridge**

The take-out double is a bid utilized by a bridge partnership to announce an opening hand and very few of the openers bid it. It is usually used in second position although I suppose one could use this bid with an intervening pass or two.

If agreed upon, the partnership could conceivably use the "take-out" bid through to 2 spades. It is a useful tool when the person using the bid can stand any of the other three suits. Notice how the bid is engineered in today's hand.

**THE ANALYSIS:**

Things will start quietly enough with a 1H opening by East, and most Souths will scrape up a light takeout double. West will redouble to show 10 points but North should bid 1S. N-S will undoubtedly compete to 2S, forcing E-W to guess whether to continue to 3H. If they do, North will double and East could go down three, losing four hearts and a trick in each other suit.

If E-W judge to pass 2S, it will not be easy for North to scramble eight tricks. The normal line of

trying to establish dummy's diamonds does not work because of the 4-1 break, but if North can give up a heart before the diamond Ace is knocked out, he can escape with one diamond loser.

Ontario Liberal Leader David Peterson hopes to press the government into a comprehensive review of the May 13 budget by a committee of the Legislature.

Writing to mayors, reeves and school board chairmen, Mr. Peterson is requesting analysis of the impact of the budget on the communities they serve.

The Haltom board of education has been asked to pass on such information to the Clerk of the Ontario Legislature, Roderick Lewis, who will convey it to a government committee hearing testimony from outside experts and people affected by the budget.

The board's finance committee was assigned the job of responding to Mr. Peterson's request Thursday night.
