It would seem to this bridge player that the "alternate" line of play by the experts as disclosed in today's analysis to make seven tricks is reaching. However, the analysis does state that a bid of 6 by South is optimistic and infers that the slam is a very low percentage one.

one loser in the majors and this seems optimistic. It would appear that declarer should lose a heart and a spade (taking the finesse is the correct percentage play when missing three to the King), and this is what would happen if East cashes the H-Ace at trick one. But if East makes the more normal lead of a club or a diamond, North is presented with an alternate line. The idea is if the player with the S-King has 3 clubs, declarer can get rid of his heart on the fourth club. North may lead to the S-Ace at trick two planning to run the clubs and reap an unexpected bonanza when the S-King falls - making seven and a bundle of points.
