

In the "professional" piping competition, Georgetown resident Jim McGillvray won the open "pibroch" event.

Gates opened promptly at 8 a.m. with members of the Georgetown Lions Club handling ticket sales. By noon, most of the competitions had already passed their first round. Crowds gathered at centre field for the gala opening ceremonles, lead by honorary games chieftain Henry Shannon, a broadcaster for CFRB radio.

George Forgan, presi-dent of the Ontario Pipers and Pipe Band Society, led the colorful and spine-tingling march of the massed bands past the podium. Among the bands were two American entries, one from Chicago and another from Birmingham, Michigan. The Georgetown Legion Pipe Band and the Georgetown Girls Pipe Band also competed this year but didn't place.

Meanwhile, above the skirl of pipes, North Amerlean records in such events as the 16-pound Scottish hammer toss and the 56-pound weight for distance were being shattered with awesome regularity.

Mr. Harrington took top spot in all seven heavy events at the games for a clean-sweep events total of 49 points. In the 16-pound hammer event, he shattered the old record of 123-feet, ten inches with a throw of 129 feet, eight inches.

In the 56-pound weight for distance, Mr. Harrington managed a toss of 40 feet, one inch to shatter

the North American record and he set a new record in the 22-pound hammer toss with a throw of 103 feet, four inches which broke the previous mark of 101 feet, six

He won the 35-pound stone put toss with a 30 feet, 10 inch throw. He also came first in the 28-pound weight for distance, the caber toes (in which contestants try to heave a large wooden pole weighing approximately 200 pounds) and the 56-pound weight for height.

The farmer's walk was won by Metro Toronto police officer Dan Markovic who, balancing 207 pounds in each hand, waddled 344 feet down the field, better than the 337 feet achieved last year, but not quite as good as the Speyside games record of 467.5 feet set a few years






