# Tackle strength to be a force in Cup play

World Cup Soccer began in earnest on Sunday with Argentina first to play in defence of its 1978 championship. Belgium were to provide stern, yet token, opposition following the impressive opening ceremonies.

This was not to be. The Belgian team did not come to lose and fought for every ball until the final whistle, upsetting the champions by 1-0.

A pattern emerged early on in the game. Strength in the tackle is going to be a force in this cup championship, and many free kicks will be given away if this game is an indication of what is to come. Goals will be scarce with tight and illegal marking by defenders.

Some 37 games will be shown on CBC who are to be commended upon taking a real world championship series. 106 countries started on the trail 4 years ago culminating in 24 teams going to Spain. There will have been over 600 games played to decide the eventual winner.

The concensus of opinion is that Brazil, West Germany, Argentina, Spain (as the host nation usually does well) may fill the last four spots.

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
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
