# Bass season

Today is the last day of June. This month has been one of loss for me, and also of gain. I have lost a long time flahing friend and have made a new friend. Does everything in life balance itself out eventually? Not without great effort, but it can and will. At last the bass season is open, and I can pursue my great love of this fish.

Opening day I spent at Mountsberg wildlife centre fishing for the bass there. The Halton Region Conservation Authority, as mentioned here recently, has a base fishing contest on. The last two days are July 3rd and 4th from 9 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.

Prizes are for best "mess of fish", largest caught by oldest angler, largest fish caught, and largest fish by angler under 12 years. If the size of last weekend's fish is any pattern, then next weekend's should be better and may see the winner taken then. Personally, I caught and released ten bass, all small, although I lost a large one at the net (of course). Get to Mountsberg via Campbellville below Hwy 401 and Guelph Line.

#### BASS GOOD

Bass fishing over the Province was generally good, for those who kept in mind the cooler weather of late and the late (or non-existent) spawning. Much high water in south central Ontario has made a great difference to where the bass are situated, and where a fisherman was able to fish for them.

Acton's Fairy Lake is about dead, and needs a boost as well as control of the duck and goose population. Posibly a little action by the area's fishermen may get some action, let's hope so and

One of my greatest joys tas far as fishing goes) is using a Fly Rod for bass and pike. I have one fly rod that is reserved for that purpose alone, and is balanced for a heavier line and leader and the aboty to throw a heavy bug or streamer a good distance.

One of fresh water's ultimate thrills, the use of a fly rod for these game fish could ruin you to other types of fishing, if you are not strong enough to resist the temptation.

A bass bug taper line has a shorter and heavier middle section designed to cast large wind resistant bass bugs a maximum distance with a minimum of false casting.

Some flyrodders use others but that is my choice. Using the criteria of short leaders for sinking lines and longer ones for a floating fly line, a fisherman should then consider the ultimate tip

strength of the tapered leader. Choose your own reel, and a rod that will take a seven or eight weight fly line. More help in this is available at any reasonable time by writing me and requesting such help. Love to do it.

RADIO RESEARCH The June-July issue, book 43, of the IN-FISH-ERMAN is of great help to the bass fisherman. A special section on the radio research and tracking of bass has brought to light many new facts and

bowling of M. Hinds. Both batamen took the total score from 13 to 82 before Lall lost his wicket.


