Fourth PHSA Cup

In addition to the enjoyment of taking part in the tournament, all participants will receive a specially-designed crest recognizing their involvement. Members of the winning and runner-up teams in all nine divisions will each receive player trophies.

The Burger King Association Cup gets underway July 9 and runs until the middle of September with the finals slated for either the end of September or beginning of October, depending on game schedules and weather.
