

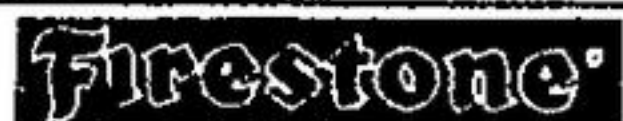

Testing it out:

Overall, the Georgetown Golf club presents "a challenge to the medium and low handicapper," Golf Director Doug Bruten says.

"The course generates a love-hate relationship. It's a challenge for a good golfer and frustrating for a beginner. You pay for errant shots," he says.

For a medium golfer, "it's testing you," Bruten says. "The course can always reach out and grab you, which is a sign of a good course," he says.

The Georgetown golf course is not a long course, but it has many natural hazards, Assistant Pro Dave Kemshead says. The course is also very hilly, so that the golfer has a lot of uphill and downhill lies.

The contour of the greens are excellent, he says. It is important not to hit the ball a long way, but to be able to put it into position, the Assistant Pro says.

For a beginner, the course might be considered tough, but a good golfer would find the

course very interesting, Kemshead says.

SEEKS EXPANSION

The Georgetown club, which is semi-private, wants to expand its boundaries to some adjacent property, Golf Director Doug Bruten says.

He thinks that some of the course's holes could be moved within the next five years to accommodate estate-type housing overlooking some greens on one acre lots. The course would still be maintained as an 18-hole club.

The Georgetown club was built 20 years ago when farm property was purchased for the venture.

The old farmhouse still stands, but a modern addition with dining facilities, lockers, a bar and a sauna was built 15 years ago, Bruten says.

SOLD INTEREST

After five years, the original 13 owners sold their interest in the golf club in four individuals, one of whom was Bruten.

Ten years ago the course was sold to East-

can Developments, with Bruten remaining as an interested party.

The course was constantly improved upon to the point where it gained notoriety by hosting two PGA tournaments, in 1967 and 1969.

Bruten says he has noticed that recently the course is becoming popular with residents from nearby Bramalea.

The club has swimming facilities and the interior has been re-decorated which makes the banquet hall a favorite for wedding receptions, Bruten says.

Non-members can call for a tee-off time, although members have a chance first to reserve a time, Bruten says.

There will always be a future for golf at the Georgetown golf club, but the Eastcan company wants to start the development of homes overlooking the golf course, with "a private home over every hole," Bruten says.

Bruten hopes the homes can be constructed within

the next few years, but he says it depends on when it is "politically expedient" to do so.

Eastcan has 105 acres beside the Georgetown Golf Club's course which would eventually include five or six holes and a

number of estate homes, Bruten says.

NO FLOODING

The Georgetown Golf club course used to have flooding problems on a number of holes early in spring, but the modifications to the Glen Williams

dam has alleviated the problem, Bruten says.

Dave Kemshead and Dave Rivers are available anytime through the week for lessons while Bob Rae takes over at the helm on weekends.
