



## Smith earns Pan-Am berth

Georgetown's Doug Smith avenged his disappointment in the provincial high school track championships this spring by rising to new heights on the Canadian track circuit.

Smith posted a personal best (for electronic time) in the 800 metres in Winnipeg last Saturday and Sunday at the Canadian track circuit.

lan Junior track and field championships. His first place finish enabled him to gain a berth on the Canadian team which will be entered in the Pan-Am Games in August.

For Smith it was a run which spelled revenge at the finish because he hit the tape ahead of four OFSAA (high school championships) runners who had beat him earlier in the season, depriving him of the Ontario crown.

In the 15,000 metre run, Smith placed fourth. Smith competed against 40 runners in the 800 metres and clocked a time of 1:51.7.

The Georgetown runner will now be part of a Canadian track and field team heading to Venezuela for the Pan-Am Games. The Games are held for athletes from North and South America under the age of 19 years. Smith says he is looking

forward to the chance to race against some top competitor from the United States. The Canadian team meets July 22 where they will spend a week in Houston, Texas, training until July 27 when they leave for Venezuela.

In the Winnipeg 800 metre race, Smith says the first lap was not quick, but the pace picked up considerably after that. He led for the first 500 metres, was passed

with 300 metres to go, but then kicked in for the win with 150 metres left in the race.

Smith has already signed on with the University of Missouri on a track scholarship and he will start training with their team in late August.

The Scarborough Optimist track club sponsored Smith in travelling to Winnipeg for the Junior Canadian Games.

## North Halton club begins clean-up

North Halton Golf and Country Club golfers were back on the course this week even though serious flood damage from last Monday's storm prevented some holes from being played.

Manager of North Halton, Mrs. Marion Faulkner, said golfers are able to play the first six holes, plus the 16th, 17th and 18th holes. The remainder of the course still requires some repairs.

Both ponds on the property require work. The dams were not damaged, but the earth surrounding them just gave out, Mrs. Faulkner said. One of the pumping stations also has to be repaired.

The eighth fairway received damage from stumps, stones and silt and will also require some work, Mrs. Faulkner said. Estimates of damage to the course range between \$70-80,000 she said.

The defensive player of

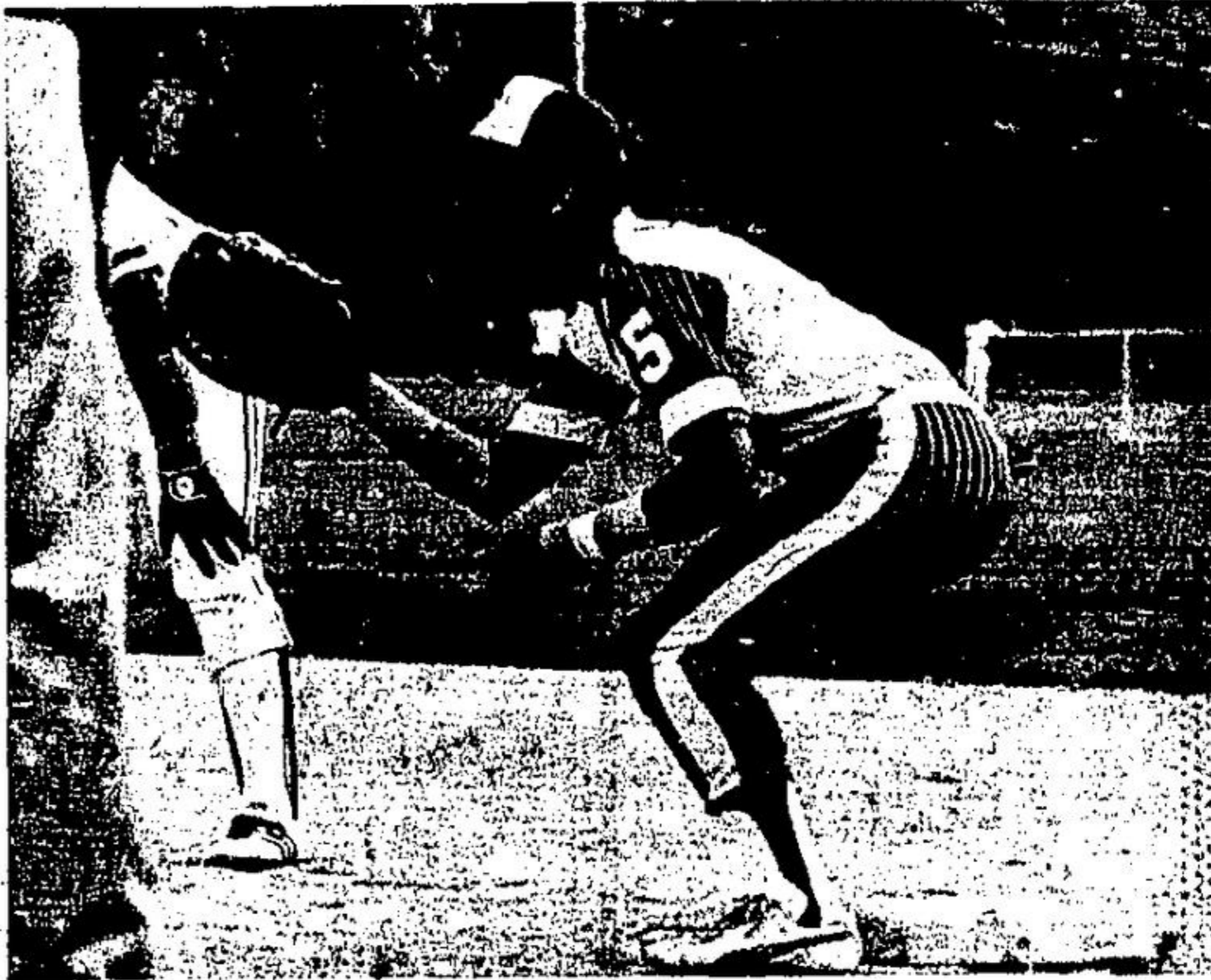

## Raider Peter Sturgeon among Jr. B Geminis coaching hopefuls

The new general manager of the Georgetown Junior B Geminis, Bob Webster, says Georgetown Chrysler Raider star Peter Sturgeon is being considered to fill the Gemini coaching spot for the 1982-3 season.

In an interview Monday, Webster admitted that he's never talked to Sturgeon personally, but would "consider him as a coach."

Sturgeon was perhaps the best two-way player in the Intermediate A loop last year, gaining All-Star status at left wing while assisting Raider Gerry Ingalls with coaching duties.

who understands young people," GM Bob Webster says. The new general manager also says he is looking for someone who can show the Gemini players rather than just tell them.

He would prefer to hire a young coach below the age of 40 years and he doesn't believe that Junior B experience as a coach is a prerequisite.

Webster said he and his three-man committee to select a coach (consisting of Bob Tost, Dean Taylor and Bob McCandless Sr.) will take at least three weeks to make up their minds on a suitable candidate.

Meanwhile, in the Georgetown Chrysler Raider's search for a coach, Sturgeon might also be on their minds as a candidate. Vice-President of hockey operations, Don Fenaley, would only say that one candidate is away on holidays and he is expecting to

reply to the club's inquiries to become a coach - that person was not Sturgeon, Fenaley says.

Club president Bob Hooper says there is a

possibility that someone from the Raiders player roster could become coach, but added, "there are no real hard and fast plans. There are no names in the hat."

## Biathlon trekking

The Second Annual Acton Biathlon: Not a large or prestigious event, but getting larger and maintaining a grueling character.

As witnessed last Sunday morning in and around the streets of Acton, about 25 (two-person) teams ran and cycled a total of ten kilometres.

Not as easy as it sounds.

The format of the race was a start at the Acton arena where one member of a team begins on a bicycle and the other begins on foot. Both travel the same route and after a distance of 2 1/4 kilometres the rider (expected to be ahead) leaves the bike at an exchange point and begins the next 2 1/4 kilometres as a runner.

Conversely the runner arrives at the exchange point and begins a riding portion. At the next exchange point, another 2 1/4 kilometre farther, the cycle repeats itself until the end of the race, again at the Acton arena.

The course has a total of three exchanges. The placing of the final team member determines the team's placing.

The winner for this year's biathlon was the team of Dale MacGregor and Jon Lancaster, win-

ning the male 17-25 division and placing first overall.

Second place overall belongs to the mixed team of George Gidmon and Doreen Vranick, both from Acton.

One of the hazards of the race was the possibility of crashing the bicycle. Bob Lovegrove was one of the most severely injured people in the race, as he sustained scratches on his back, shoulder, legs, arms and hands when he "wiped out" after hitting an obstacle. His team with Eric Hopkins placed third overall.

With little preparation or planning, both Lancaster and MacGregor said they ran the event for fun. They commented that the cycling seemed hardest but there was also the difficulty of trying to run after biking.

The common feeling was that of uncoordination from having your "rhythm thrown off" after getting off the bike.

Organizer and initiator of the biathlon, Ed Leatherland said he was very happy with the increased response, with more than three times the number of teams entered as last year. Both he and Jim Rivett considered the day a success.

Other comments on the race, which was sponsored by the Y's Men's Club, are having nearly half of the field female, opposed to last year's all male
