More than other lures

More than any other lure, the most asked about, and the least understood is the spinner ball. At each every show I put on the SASSY SHAD Is demonstrated as it is the best all round balt you can

It takes Bass, both largemouth and small mouth, and Pike. Trout are sometimes brought to net with a spinner balt, although not regularly. Walleye sometimes will take nothing else. When I fish for bass and pike or even walleye, the first bait on my line is a Sass Shad spinner balt.

Sometimes just the Sassy Shad body on a plain jig hook works wonders, especially for walleye. Yours truly has used the body on a jig in the smaller sizes to jig for trout through the ice.

If you want an all round bait, then try the Sassy Shad at all levels of fishing; surface, mid-depth and on bottom. Of course it is not the only bait I use, that would stunt my growth as a fisherman, but it is the first and most used.

After the heavy rains and consequent floods in the Georgetown area last week, the whole stream environment will be changed. If you fish a river or stream after a flood, then you must re-check the area for the newly formed pockets and see if the old ones are washed out or filled in.

WORD FOR WISE Sometimes the flood will break out stocked ponds and the trout are added to the stream to make excellent fishing for a while. Simply a word to the wise. I know that I have to find that big trout that has been eluding me since opening day. Maybe he is

now in another location. Heavy flooding will sometimes change the fishing pattern in a lake. If the water running into a lake is heavy enough, the weed and sometimes stones and logs will be washed around or even moved considerable distances. Siltation may occur, and you are now back to square one. Part of the fun

Putting - that other game

It is said on tour that the game of golf is comprised of two factions.

One is in the air, the other is on the ground. It is the one on the ground that we will draw our attention in this article.

Putting -- as is often heard -- Is that other game. Putting, to myself, is quite simple. There are two or three requirements at address the golfer has to pay attention to.

One, is that of placing the putter on your intended line (i.e. the line which you feel will be the correct line for holing the putt). Two, that your eye line is directly over the line that you have selected and three, that the grip pressure is fairly light on the golf club.

Now we arrive at the point of actually striking the ball. The one and only thing that need be done at this point is to make sure that the putter travels on your selected line.

Once this procedure has been followed a number of times it now comes down to one fact: did I move the putter far enough back and through to get the ball to the hole?

In essence we boil it down to a system. If the system is followed, you will always visualize the same thing, therefore, your body and mind may now have a chance to respond the same way.

Just a short note on equipment. The putter must suit you. Do not change your style because of the




