## Energy saving tips at farming museum

Learn to beat the high cost of energy at the Ontario Agricultural Museum near Milton! The Museum is hosting "Energy Days" July 17 and 18 - an opportunity to explore historic and modern sources of alternate power.

Ever wondered what will be used if the price of gasoline gets too high? Well, this special weekend features a Model A Ford which runs on ethanol and a new 1982 Mercury Cougar which is powered by propane. The Museum's steam and gasoline engines will also be operating around the 80-

acre site. In co-operation with the University of Guelph, several items will be on display - a methane digester, solar panels, a canola powered tractor and a computer which programs the alcohol fuel needs of a farm or industry.

As well as the special energy exhibits, visitors are welcome to explore the Museum's 80 acre site. More than 20 buildings and displays tell the story of farming in Ontario from the 1800s to the present.

Thus came into being the Great War Veterans Association formed about 1920 and active until 1926.

A number of our Georgetown veterans belonged to this organization. Their meeting place was in the upstairs of the building adjoining the Golden Gate Cafe, now Yong's Restaurant, then known as the Brooke Block.

## N.B. premier greets our W.I. delegates

Three Georgetown area ladies attended the National Convention of the Federated Women's Institutes of Canada held at the University of New Brunswick in Fredericton June 13 to 17.

Norma Alexander, Ontario board director, Doris Lindsay, past president of Halton District, and Muriel Nurse, Ashgrove branch member, were among the 600 delegates from across Canada.

Two Georgetown girls who moved to New Brunswick three years ago took an active role. Janet Nurse Guimond, now a member of the Nerepis branch, was looking after day tickets, while Brenda McNeil of the Gladwyn branch was convention pianist.

Premier Richard Hatfield welcomed the delegates to his province and declared June 16 as Women's Institute Day in New Brunswick. On that day, ten special tours to all parts of the "picture province" had been arranged. This gave the local Women's Institutes a chance to extend their wonderful

hospitality to all the visitors from across Canada.

The provincial department of agriculture also hosted the final banquet which featured Atlantic salmon and fiddleheads.

The convention theme "Concerns and Challenges" was the thought behind all the keynote speakers. Professor Siemens, associate dean of agriculture at the University of Manitoba, compared the situations in Canada and the Third World countries, especially in the field of agriculture.

J.E. Green, senior consultant for Prince Edward Island, spoke on Women and Economic Development. Monica Townson, an Ottawa economic consultant, brought the delegates up to date on pensions for women.

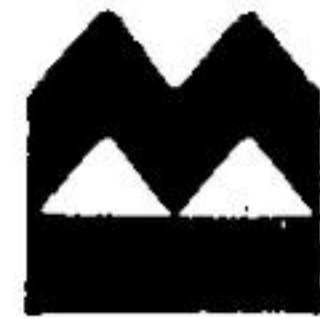
