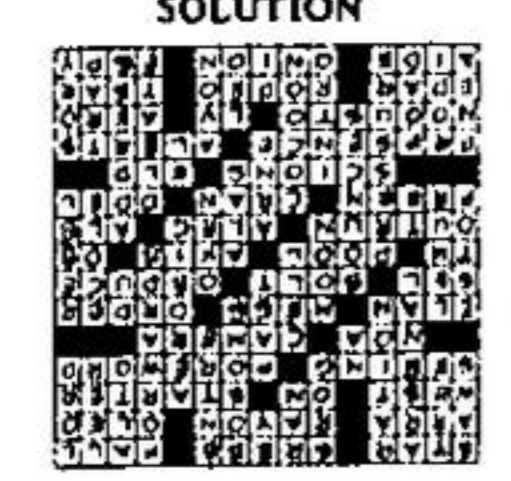
The Herald is perhaps the single most effective means we have of communicating with the public. Because of this coverage our Optimist Club of Georgetown has become much better known in Halton Hills.
