World Cup fever is over. Italy are No. 1 in the world, rightly crowned as champions as they deservedly defeated Germany in the final game in Madrid before 100,000 wildly cheering fans.
 The game is just over as I write and already I am looking forward to 1986 and the next tourney in Colombia. Whilst the majority of nations will be the same as this year there will no doubt be a few new faces as usual. I wonder if some of the 1982 'rabbits' will make the journey to South America.
 Canada's chances may be harder than this year when we had an excellent opportunity to qualify. The final itself was a dramatic match. Surprisingly enough it was Germany committing more fouls than Italy throughout the whole game. The Italians continued the attacking flair shown in the victories over Brazil, Argentina and Poland.
 As I wrote a couple of weeks ago after the poor

GOALIE'S MOVES IGNORED
 Some last thoughts from the whole shebang now. The goalie's four step rule was ignored. Dino Zoff, Italy, carried 15 steps in more than one game, more than one time (seven times in the Poland game, in the first half no less). The number of unpunished fouls in almost every game were colossal.

Cautions issued (yellow cards) did not have any effect on the hatchet men. They would not be allowed on the field at our level. Which leads me to a final comment for the moment.

There is a big difference between the game at world pro level and ours, and the decisions made in Spain will not assist we locals in our officiating.

At last week's Peel Halton disciplinary committee meeting one youth player could not understand why the referee in his game ejected him for a second caution in the game when it did not happen in Spain. He was suspended all the same. Two coaches were suspended and their clubs fined for persistent dissent towards the respective referees.

A 16-year old goalkeeper was put out of the game until 31 Dec. 1982 for his behavior in a game. The Inter County league also handed out a

couple of suspensions at their disciplinary meeting. Four players are to appear before the committee prior to the league meeting in Milton on the 15th for violent conduct and misconduct. Results from last week are headed by the Mariners 13-0 win over ICCM who were shorthanded on the evening and Mariners took full advantage.

A shock result from Trafalgar Road, where visiting Acton made the victory by the odd goal in five (ie. 3-2) over the injury struck Eagles who drop to second place in the standings.

Second Division Butcher retain top spot in spite of the confirmed loss to Bracken by 1-3 in the abandoned fixture. Bracken climb a little closer to the leader with a win over Pineview. In fact both teams have only each lost two points in the first half of the league program.

Last week I commented upon the Soccer International school days later this month. Regrettably due to an almost complete lack of response the school is cancelled.

Jeff Stephen, the director tells me he is very disappointed as he had considered Georgetown one of the better response clubs around based upon the past couple of years. Maybe we know it all!
