Property rights concern area board

Concerned that an individual's rights surrounding the ownership of property have been eroded in recent years, largely due to a proliferation of restrictive laws from provincial, municipal and federal legislatures, the Brampton Real Estate board will sponsor its second "Private Property Week" Oct. 3 to 11.

Research conducted by University of Western Ontario law professors and discussed in a publication entitled "Losing Ground" indicate that restrictions on property rights through provincial legislation amounts to more than 700 different laws.

This doesn't include municipal zoning restrictions or what some people have referred to as the loss of property rights in the recently passed Charter of Rights.

As part of the Private Property Week, the board is planning a number of functions to make the public more aware of the problem. When the

special week was discussed and approved by Halton Hills town council, Mayor Pete Pomeroy described the number of ways in which property

rights have been eroded as "hair-raising" and strongly threw his support behind the board's plans for October.
