

'Hockey technician' our new Sabre coach

The Acton Junior B Sabres hockey club selected Bill Richmond of Georgetown to lead their charges into the 1982-3 season last Thursday night.

The newly hired coach is a familiar face to hockey people in a number of organizations ranging from house teague hockey to the NHL Bulfalo Sabres.

Ron Jeffrey, general manager of the Sabres said he and Bill Richmond went to their very first hockey coaching clinic together many years ago. Today Richmond is one of a select

group who holds a level five national coaching certificate. As well as leading an active life in

hockey as a coach since 1954. Richmond is also an avid hockey technician and administrator.

He is the chief coaching co-ordinator for the Metropolitan Toronto Hockey League (MTHL), regional co-ordinator for Hockey Ontario's Halton-Peel-Wentworth-Hamilton districts and part of the Ontario Hockey Association's (OHA) member development and communication commit-

Ron Jeffrey says Richmond is well

educated in hockey and a go-getter who had made every team a winner. "He's mature, competent and able to take theory and practice and put them together," Jeffrey says.

Because Richmond has been with young hockey players for the past ten years, Jeffrey says the new coach will have "a bankbook full of young people...a reservoir of talent to draw upon,"

Richmond was one of the people helping to make cuts to the very successful Oakville Bludes hockey team last season in the Central Junior

"He demands good heads up hockey," Jeffrey says, "His players are stylist and they're very good

playmakers. He's a very good instructor in skills. They play pretty hockey --

Jeffrey said that he was sorry Jules Russiani who led the team for two years into the playoffs was not able to come back, but he is expecting a "fresh approach" from Richmond.

CONTROLLED SYSTEM The new couch says he likes a controlled type of system which means he doesn't like to see his players "dumping it in." He believes you have to design a team around what you have in the way of talent, but he says he has learned from European hockey.

Richmond coached his Oakville team against the Czechoslovakian National Juvenile team in 1981 and won

high praise from many hockey minds, including Oakville Blades president Murray Walker, for their 9-6 loss ugainst the Czech Nationals.

In games before the Oakville contest, the Czechs defeated Oshawa 9-2. Belleville 16-1, Peterborough 6-2 and Hamilton 12-3.

Oakville lead the Czech National 6-5 late in the second period. "The Czech coaches told me that no team had ever scored on them so many times, so easily," Richmond says.

TEAM'S TACTICS "It was more the Oakville team's tactics which slowed us up, than it was us having a bad game," stated Czech
