

# Jon wins the first round

## Local biker competes in Canadian National Championship series

Easily out-distancing a field of Canadian expert dirt-trackers, including the current and former Canadian National Champions, Jon Cornwell led the 12 lap final of the Norm Carr Memorial Half Mile from start to finish Sunday.

Cornwell is the first Canadian and only the second name inscribed on the permanent trophy. Each previous race had been won by the spectacular young Michigan rider Scott Parker who is now third in the points standings in the American championship series.

"You don't know how much this means to me" said Cornwell accepting the three foot high trophy from Norm Carr's father. "I'm really proud to be the first Canadian to win this race."

Cornwell shrugged himself back into the jacket of his racing leathers for the benefit of the television cameras.

He was red-eyed from the dust and fatigue and obviously suffering from the 30 degree temperatures displayed the names of his sponsors, Decey Harley Davidson, Bel-Ray Lubricants and Champion spark plugs while struggling to kiss the trophy girls,

thank his mechanic, Brian Olsen, and juggle the trophy, the checkered flag and assorted programmes and pens.

In post-victory celebration interviews Cornwell and his mechanic agreed it had been a trying weekend. They had left Georgetown late Thursday night for a Winston Pro race just west of Chicago. Shortly after their arrival there the rains started and the race was eventually cancelled.

They drove straight back to Georgetown again - arriving about four in the morning - snatched a few hours of sleep and re-organized the operation for the Belleville race. Shortly after arriving at the Belleville fairgrounds on Saturday - the rains came down - and once again the rain was cancelled. Virtually all the riders scrambled around in the Belleville area for rooms hoping the race would be run on Sunday.

It was - in extremely hot and dusty conditions. "It's almost impossible to control the dust on these tracks during the day - that's why so many of these races are run at night. They can water the track until it's soaked and halfway

through the event we're running in a total fog - the only good place to be in is out in front" grinned Cornwell.

Though he won the feature event of the day Cornwell didn't fare so well in the support classes. He finished fourth in the 500 expert class behind three hard charging Canadian experts - all mounted on Honda 500 singles.

Cornwell's 500cc Yamaha was clearly outclassed in top end power as the three Hondas would stretch out their lead on the straights while Cornwell could catch them only in the corners. The lightweight bike he was planning to ride belonging to Bob Sobering of Brantford was an early casualty of the heat and a faulty ignition. Sobering and Dave Broomhead wound up battling over fifth and sixth places in the Senior 500 final after both had clawed their way into the race by way of hard won first and second place finishes in the semi-final.

Broomhead, riding his newly rebuilt Honda, grabbed the lead from Sobering midway through the semi in a spectacular dash that picked off the first five riders in one fell swoop.

What made the feat even more impressive was the fact that he did it after suffering a bad crash in a previous race when a rider in front of him stopped suddenly with a seized motor. Broomhead, unable to avoid him flew over the handlebars - and the track's protective fencing.

The other Georgetown riders, Mike Doucette and Steve Duff, produced mixed results. Broomhead had been riding Mike's lightweight when he crashed and though they managed to get the bike back on the track in time for Mike's race - it wasn't running well and Mike finished well down in the pack.

However, in revenge Doucette took home a creditable 2nd place finish in the Junior 500 final - riding Broomhead's Honda.

Steve Duff fought his way through the highly competitive 250 expert heat and semi-final but could only snatch the bridesmaid's spot as first alternate for the final. Nobody broke so he didn't get to ride.

The Belleville race was the first round in the Canadian National Championship series.

### Lure takes muskie scene by storm

That is top class calling action to a muskie, and is sure to get you the lunker you have been after the past few years. Get on the record books, get a Super Vibrax Bucks.

#### RICE LAKE

The Rice Lake Bass tournament is now history, at least for 1982. Next years will be hot if this years entries were any indication. The tournament was booked solid with a waiting list.

Steve Clapper and Ron Langmyer from Lima, Ohio won the two day event at Rice Lake with a total catch of 45.24 pounds. More than \$20,000 in cash and merchandise went to the two man team who finished from Hiawatha Tent and Trailer park on Rice Lake July 10 and 11.

Langmyer and Clapper won \$2,000, a Lund boat, a Caltrailer, a 25 HP Mercury motor and Deer skin vests. Second place went to Dan Fontana, brother to Irman Fontana of Georgetown, and Glenn Carr from Willowdale, Ont. They weighed in a catch for the two days of 33.87 pounds.

Each live release in the tournament was a bonus of four ounces, to encourage the sportsmanship of the event, and to promulgate the idea of catch and release fishing in Ontario.

#### FISH TAGGED

Six of the released fish were tagged. The next person to catch them will win Zebco rods and reels. The largest fish of the day won a Mercury thruster motor and including the live release bonus, these fish weighed 6.15 pounds and 5.14 pounds. The top lure was 8 inch black plastic worms in the shallow weeds.

Remington arms has released a new 22 cal. round this year. The VIPER 22 has a flat trajectory, "Hyper Velocity" round based on a standard 22 long rifle case. However the Viper has a muzzle velocity of 266fps faster than that of 22 long rifle standard velocity rounds.

Well worth looking for and practicing with for the fall hunt. I have not received any recent released of the DIGET BOOKS, but when looking through my library for material for this column, I search my Digest Books and they sure are worth adding to any ones library or bookshelves.
