Two town workers were sitting on stone steps taking a break when a little boy in a blue cap thrust a package of pink round bubble gums at them. "Want one?"

Don McDonald, 16, and Kelly White, 18, of Acton are getting to know the little people in their town. Through their summer job, they're also getting to know the downtown merchants.

The two teenagers are helping keep downtown Acton clean with their brooms and shovel. Every day they sweep up and down Mill Street and Main Street along the business

Besides pushing their brooms, the two are also watering and weeding the flower boxes beautifying the downtown.

"The people are really friendly and they'll stop and chat or tell you you're doing a good job," Kelly

Don added that many of the storekeepers offer them pop to cool off.

"If it's really hot, we'll take a break and not push the broom too hard that day," Kelly said.

The two friendly young people said the first week of their summer job was the hardest. There was a lot of dust and dirt to take off the Acton sidewalks which had collected over the spring. Now it's a lot easier for them, with most of their sweeping being dally garbage.

"I think it's mainly kids. They just throw everything out all over the place," Kelly said. "We could clean twice a day and it would be all dirty by the afternoon again, especially down by the varlety store. Funnlest thing, too, there's about four garbage cans down there.

She said they collect a lot of cigarette packages to, not putting the entire blame on the town's youngsters.

"I guess it's just a habit; people whip it down and figure somebody will pick it up," she said.

Their job of picking up garbage has become so ingrained that now whenever they go out anywhere they feel compelled to pick up any garbage they come across, they said.




