Then the Eagles went up against the number one team in the league next to Niagara Falls, which is the Welland squad.

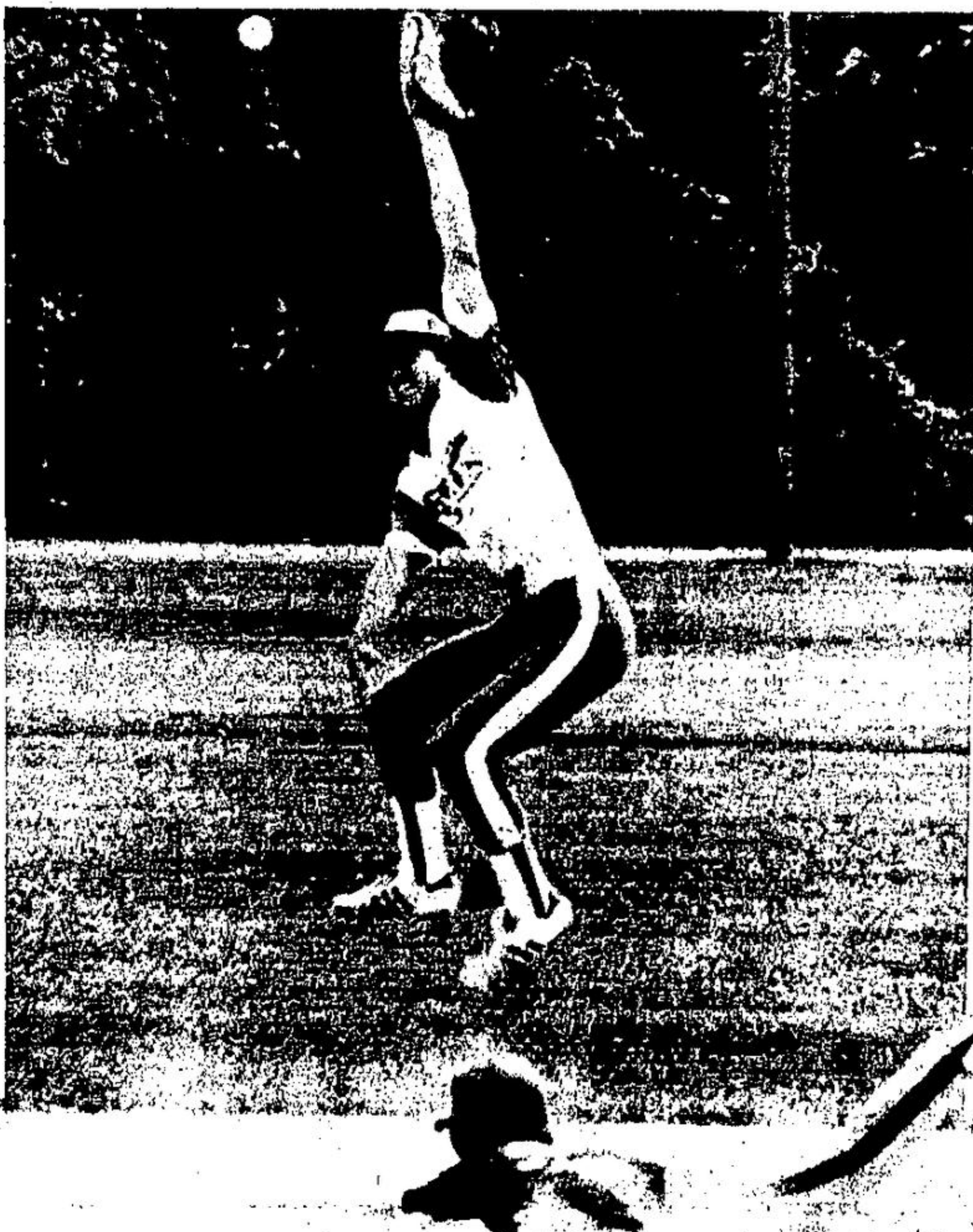
Georgetown were beaten 2-0 although there was no score going into the seventh inning, Burke said.

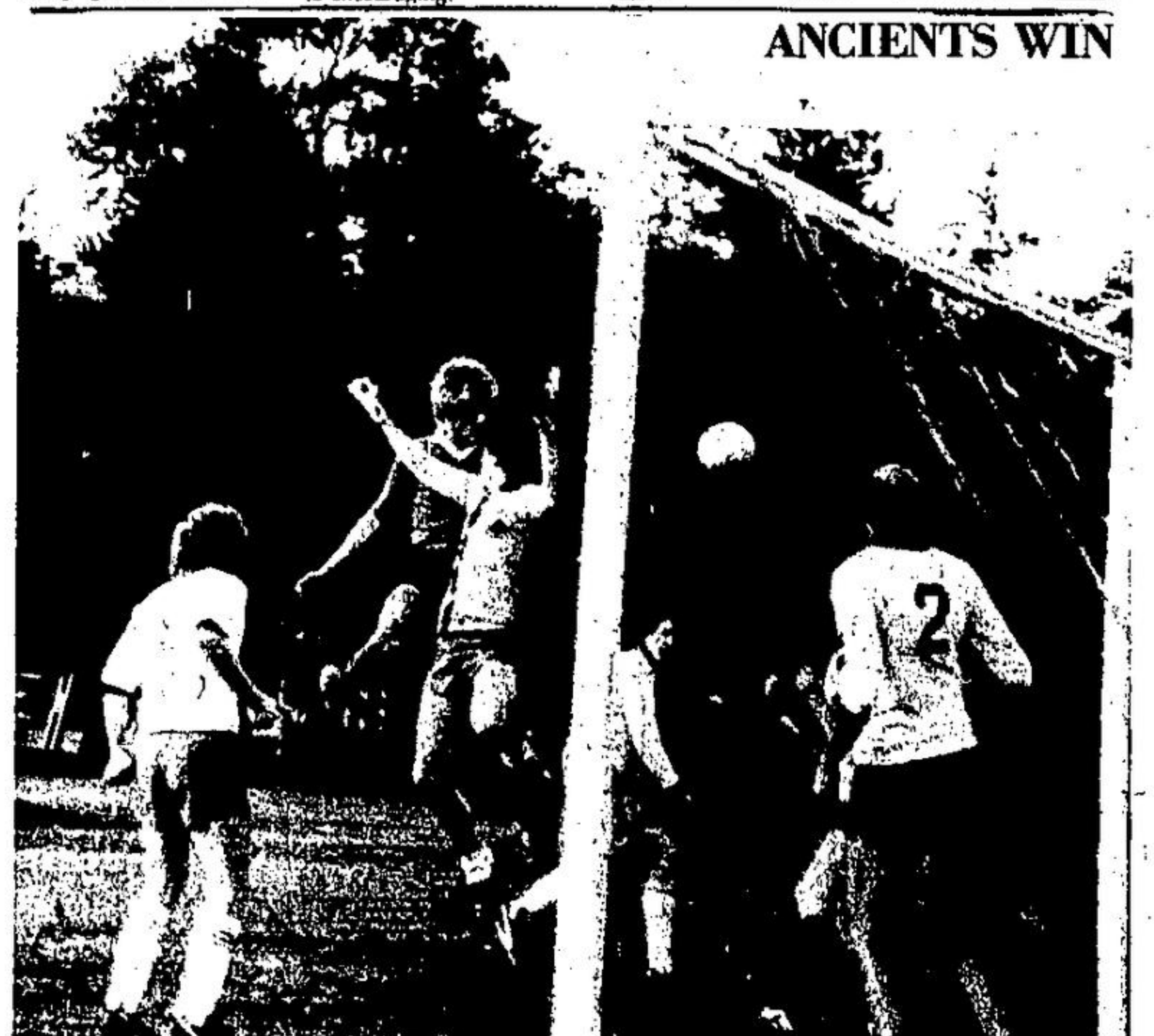
