# MD golf tourney collects \$5,000

Georgetown's annual golf tournament for Muscular Dystrophy came just a day too late for organizer Pete Norton of Glen Williams.

Norton shot a hole-in-one off the second tee the night before the charity celebrity golf tournament. It was the first hole-in-one at the Erin

Heights course all year. But more important, if Norton had been able to save that shot for the following day, Monday, the day of the tournament he would have won a gas barbecue.

The gas barbecue on the second hole was just one of the many prizes offered at the Muscular

Dystrophy tournament. As it was, Norton received a trophy from Canada Dry and Rothman's putter with a chance to draw for a trip down south. The second hole was designated by Rothman's as one of their special prize holes in a nation-wide contest.

The tournament, formerly called the Rud Whiting tournament for Muscular Dystrophy, was well attended by many celebrities from the area, including Mayor Pete Pomeroy, MPP Julian Reed and MPP John McDermid.

### Salmon catchers

The Salmon Hunt Jamboree, held at Port Credit Canadian Tire last Friday was opened by Hazel McCallium, Mayor of Mississauga. Several hundred people turned up to get in on the newest in the salmon fishing scene.

Several boat captains, along with their boats, were on display, as were lure and tackle manufacturers. John Power, of the Toronto Star Great Salmon Hunt, echoes my sentiments on the Jamboree.

John told me he thought, "the show was excellent" and those whom I spoke to that attended felt the same. I'm sure this will be one of the kick-off features of the Salmon Hunt in years to come. The hunt started officially last Saturday, and plenty of fish were taken.

Charter for this week: COHO-CATCHER CHARTERS run by Bill Webber. Bill runs a 22-foot Mirro Craft cruiser with Big Jon electric downriggers.

A SI-TEX straight line graph recorder and SI-TEX Colormatic is teamed with an electric temperature probe for better fish location. Webber keeps on the fish by 108 channel VHF radio and C.B. All equipment is supplied, and you just need lunch and warm clothing (it can get cool out there). Call Bill Webber at (416) 986-5520 and get in on the \$1,200,000 Great Salmon Hunt.

**FLUTTER POWER**  
If you have your own boat you will need a wide selection of lures to keep on the fish. The DARDEVLE FLUTTER-CHUCK and the FLUTTER CHUCK MAGNUM.

These lures are hot on salmon and come in a wide range of colors, with prism tape for extra flash. Flutter Chuck's are thin but strong and give that enticing flutter action of the Flutter Devle.

**BASS:** now is the season for Dardevle's DEVIL BUGS and the feathered weedless Dardevle. These lures are designed to draw the wily bass out of his lair, and try to make off with your offering.

The Devil Bug is a floating mouse or moth like lure that is excellent on a large fly rod and can be worked (with effort) on a spinning outfit.

**TROUT:** grasshoppers are now ready to use as bait. They are of a good size and the fish are already taking advantage of those careless enough to drop in to the drink. Give them a try on your favorite river or stream, and even on the ponds.

## 'Bests' for local runner

On Saturday and Sunday, August 7th and 8th, Sean Cleary ran two personal bests in the Ontario Track and Field Championships held in Ottawa. Running in the bantam

1,500m race, Sean won his heat going away with a time of 4:37. This time placed him fifth overall and will probably rank him as the fifth fastest bantam in Ontario.

The next day (Sunday), Sean ran in the 3,000m event and placed fifth again. His time was 9:53 for his second attempt at this distance. Last year, the winning time was 10:00 flat and this year the record fell to a very fast 9:15.

In the midget division for the Cardinal Leger Track Club Nick Zero ran a 56.79 in the 400m event and a fast 2:07.6 in the 800m to place second in his heat but 20th overall in both events.

John Gill and Tony Palhetas placed eighth

and tenth in the 1,500m race with times of 4:20 and 4:26.9.

John Gill went on to the 3,000m event to place eighth with a time of 9:17.1 where he went through the 800m mark in 2:21 and the mile in a quick 4:52.
