## Divers join search at Crawford Lake

An underwater dive will take place at Crawford Lake on Steeles Avenue and Guelph Line tomorrow (Thursday) at 1 p.m.

Divers are looking for Indian artifacts in the 90-foot deep lake and hope to discover more information about the Indian settlement located nearby. Currently, archaeologists are digging for the location of an Indian Village and have found six long-houses where Iroquois Indians existed in the late 1400s. Several thousand artifacts have been discovered in the area and recently, a bone-awl was found which was used to

carve symbols into deer hide.

Crawford Lake's small surface and unusual depth has enabled archaeologists to record environmental information as far back as 15,000 years.

A fund-raising program is now in progress to recreate the Indian Village and to also build an Interpretive Centre where visitors can obtain information about the village, Crawford Lake and the Niagara Escarpment. A fund-raising group, formed by Halton residents, called the Halton Region Conservation Foundation, hopes to raise \$700,000 over the next three years

to help build the Indian Village and Interpretive Centre. Currently, the Foundation has raised \$80,000.

Dr. William Finlayson, site archaeologist and executive director of the Museum of Indian Archaeology in London, Ontario, will be on hand to provide further information about the ongoing dig and Crawford Lake.

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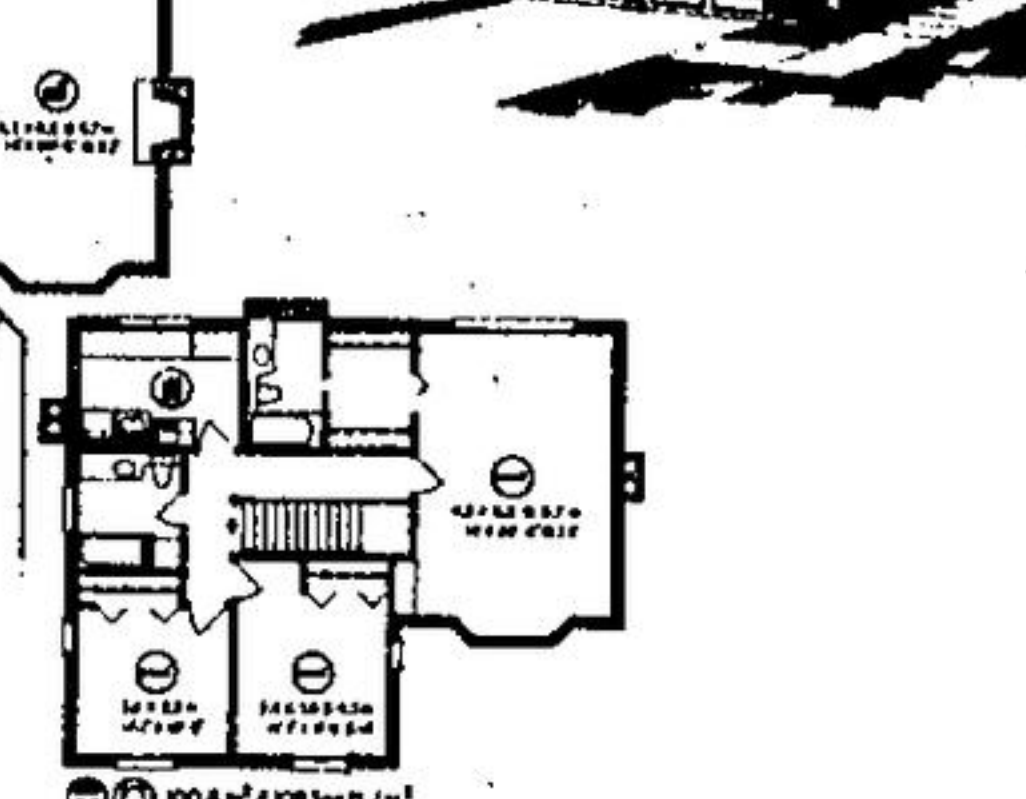
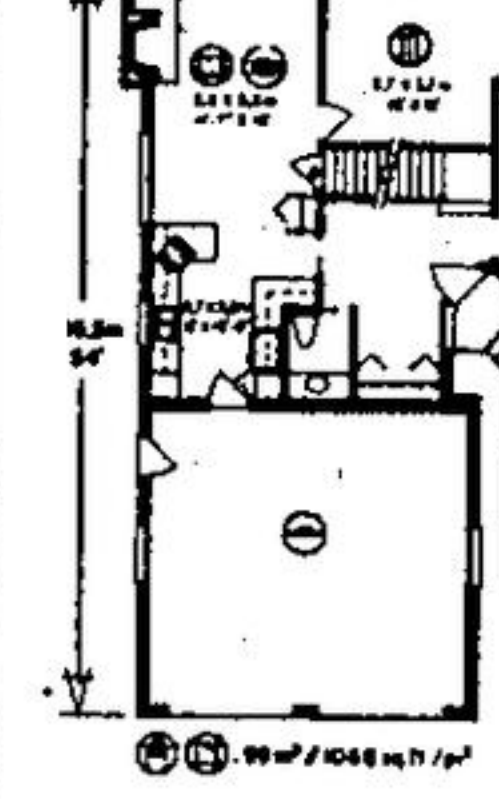
