Mrs. Tost's younger sister, Frances Wilson, was named 1982 Pioneer Citizen of the Year this past June.

Halton Hills' "Vote Yes for Nuclear Disarmament" committee is moving into the local limelight as the Nov. 8 municipal election approaches.

Town council -has already agreed to include a referendum on nuclear disarmament on election ballots joining over 60 other municipalities across Canada.

The question will likely ask whether or not one supports the concept of global nuclear disarmament, although the exact wording has not been arms proliferation.

At a meeting in Georgetown Tuesday night. committee members began to draft a strategy which will make them more visible in the three months preceding the election.

The group plans to man booths at the Georgetown and Acton fall fairs in September and will show a National Film Board of Canada production entitied "If You Love This Planet", a film which discusses the effects of a nuclear strike and how groups should organize protests against nuclear

McDermid comes home to hear complaints

Grits must go, constituents say

John McDermid returned to his home riding and his Brampton house expecting a rest from the grind of working in Ott-

What Mr. McDermid received when he got home was a wave of discontent with the Liberal government's performance.

Mr. McDermid, Brampton-Georgetown MP, said last week city constituents are fed up with the federal government and its smug attitude towards the plight of the country's economy and arrogant posture in dealing with residents' problems.

SPILLING OVER

The resentment and mistrust is spilling over to voters' views of politicions in general, the Progressive Conservative MP add-

ed. It had been just two weeks since Mr. McDermid and other MPs left Ottowa after Parliament adjourned for a late summer recess.

Membes will return Oct. 27, but the frustration and

discontent will continue through the summer and into the fall unless something favorable happens to the economy.

The latest session of the House doesn't encourage Mr. McDermid into making optimistic statements about the Liberal try at

improvement of dire straits.

The federal government is a great distance from the people - compared to . provincial or municipal governments - but the Liberal attitude in Ottawa merely adds to the isolation, the Brampton-Georgetown MP sald.

POWER TOO LONG! "I'm not sure they (the Liberals) don't care about the process of government," Mr. McDermid

pointed out. "But the party has been in power so long it takes it for granted." . Mr. McDermid met and talked with constituents on the street and at social functions recently, and he

claimed most say they are concerned about the government performance to date and the ability of Parliament to perform in the future.

He said the fact that the

government appears not to care about the economic crisis is another element prompting the "frustrating times," and underscores the fact that the Grit government is "old and tired".

Mr: McDermid spent another week resting from the Ottawa scene, returning today (Friday) to clean up some work at the capital then likely return to work on a Tory petition to ask for an election to remove the Liberals from office.

CAUTIOUS

There has been enthuslastic response for the petition from residents in the area, the MP said, but he is cautious about signaling the end for the Liber-· als.

Mr. McDermid muses that the electorate "has a short memory".
