Otta Hanus, who visited The Herald Monday looking weary but sounding enthusiastic, readily acknowledged the quick pace of filming preparations on this feature. Georgetown locations were picked Friday after a last-minute go-ahead from the producer, he said, and

Toronto sequences, including the re-enactment of Terry's parade and rousing City Hall reception before 10,000 admirers, have still to be arranged.
According to Mr. Hanus, the movie will focus on Terry, rather than the Marathon. Its script by Ed Hulme,

endorsed by Terry's parents and built on a concept approved by Terry himself, begins prior to Terry's leg amputation and conveys the psychological as well as physical tribulations the young college student faced.
The movie does follow through with Terry's

inspiring story, however, with sequences to be re-enacted in Newfoundland showing the runner dipping his artificial leg in the Atlantic Ocean before launching the Marathon.
Producer Cooper was simply one of millions of people worldwide who were touched deeply by news of the Marathon, of

its sudden end in Thunder Bay and of Terry's death shortly after. He visited Terry personally, though, after the Marathon had been abandoned, and received the green light to make the movie.
The Canadian Cancer Society, which has also approved the script, will receive a share of the movie's profits.

No foul play in drowning - police

An autopsy carried out into the death of a four-year old child Aug. 17 at Kelso Conservation Area in Milton revealed asphyxiation secondary to drowning to be the cause of death.

Halton regional police say there was no evidence of foul play in the death of Stephan Wemyss of Scarborough. The child's body was found in approximately three feet of water. Although resuscitation efforts were carried out, the victim was pronounced dead on arrival at Milton District Hospital.

Decision as to whether an inquest will be held is expected this week. This is the second drowning in two weeks at the conservation area.

According to police there were four lifeguards on duty at the beach and about 300 people in the area.

The boy was one of 22 children brought to Kelso by bus by a Toronto housing complex. Four counsellors accompanied the children on the recreational outing.

GO-in' to the CNE?

Ex-goers can take advantage of GO Train service direct to the grounds during the three-week CNE run to Sept. 6 to avoid traffic jams and parking hassles.

Just hop on any Lakeshore GO Train or take a GO Bus to Pickering, Port Credit or Oakville GO stations to board a connecting train to the Exhibition.

Two bus routes operate to the Port Credit GO station for CNE-bound travellers, one from Bramalea and the other from Brampton and Georgetown.

Buses leave from Moore Park Plaza and Delrex Plaza in Georgetown, also picking up at Norval and Huttonville. Four trips leave Georgetown on weekdays and Sundays at 9:40, 10:40, 11:40 and 12:40; Saturdays and Labor Day, a fifth trip leaves at 8:40.

Passengers making homebound bus connections at Port Credit station can board the westbound trains leaving the CNE at 48 minutes after every hour from 6:48 p.m. until 12:48 a.m. weekdays and from 4:48 p.m. until 12:48 a.m. weekends and Labor Day.

Town 'has that look about it'

Hollywood revisits us (and yes, they need extras)

Trot out the "Hollywood North" signs again, Martha, the moviemakers are bangin' on the door.

An English town with double deckers and bobbies in "Equus", a Boston-area village trimmed almost completely from "Running"; a New York community filled with July 4th parades and larceny in "Never Trust an Honest Thief"...

Now, Georgetown will be a New Brunswick town - loosely resembling Edmundston - along the route of Terry Fox's Incredible Marathon of Hope.

Residents wonder why? Why would a location scout roaming the countryside select a less-than-unique bedroom community like Georgetown as the setting for all kinds of exotic story-telling?

In the case of the Terry Fox movie, there's even more to wonder about. Among the locations selected are downtown Georgetown, which has been a key "set" for all previous productions here, and the River Drive bridge above the paper mill dam, seen several times in the botched Orson Welles adventure "Honest Thief".

Tell unit location manager Otta Hanus that there've been moviemakers here before him and he sighs, "I know, I know - we talk." But outside his cryptic reference to inter-company shoptalk, Georgetown stands on its own merits as far as this movie is concerned. It's even coincidental that the film's producer, Canadian Robert Cooper, also produced "Running", which brought Michael Douglas of "Streets of San Francisco" fame to town.

said Monday, explaining that Georgetown is close enough to Toronto and virtually on route from the northern Ontario locations. Plus, it has "that look" about it the producer was searching for. A typically Canadian town perhaps, and not unlike Edmundston to boot.

Besides Main Street and the River Drive bridge, the Fox story will be filmed on Edith Street, in the parking lot of the Georgetown Marketplace and in Norval. Outside town, film crews will be inside Kelso Conserva-

tion Area in Milton and a spot just north of Snelgrove. Outside of Ontario, footage will only be shot in Newfoundland and B.C. During his run through southern Ontario in July, 1980, of course, Terry Fox stayed along Highway 7.

Mr. Hanus said the film does need some local extras, but he doesn't want the kind of crowd scenes welcomed by the makers of "Honest Thief". The shooting takes place downtown Thursday afternoon, and residents can drop by to watch, but the Edith

Street sequences are supposed to be early morning shots and should appear quiet.

BIG CHANCE
Edith Street homeowners, however, may get their big chance at show business. Residents of the neighborhood can call Karen Pike in Toronto at 591-1746 if they'd like to work as extras, playing themselves! Only a handful are needed.

Ms. Pike will also be at Georgetown's Oddfellows Hall on Wesleyan Street tomorrow at 10 a.m.

Friday takes the crews to the marketplace and Norval, where spectators are again welcome but will be asked to keep out of the way.

Although most of the local sequences will involve sweeping shots of the Marathon in progress, the marketplace scene will see actor Robert Duvall greeting Eric Fryer, who plays Terry, and some dialogue ensues.
