

St. George's bids adieu to organist

After four years as organist and choir director at St. George's Anglican Church, Mr. Gerry Van Wyck is leaving to assume a similar position at Leaside United Church.

The minister there is the Rev. Harold Llewellyn, formerly of Georgetown. Gerry is also continuing as Director of the 70-voice North York Philharmonic Chorus and plans to take up music as a full-time interest, combining directing and teaching with further studies.

His work at St. George's displayed competent and sensitive leadership with both Junior and Senior choirs.

Special occasions culminated last April at Holy Cross Church at a service sponsored by the five Georgetown area Anglican churches. Combined choirs joined the congregation in a celebration of mission. Guest preacher was the Primate, Archbishop Edward Scott.

At a coffee hour, following the 10 a.m. service at

St. George's on Sunday, August 29th, Gerry was presented with gifts from the choir and congregation and a personal gift from the Rector, the Rev. Jim Boyles, who spoke of the close co-operation between them.

Gerry, his wife Cora and children Thomas and Jennifer live in Aurora. At this same service, the parishioners were introduced to Miss Elaine Weimer who has been hired to replace Gerry.

After a time teaching Grades 2 and 3 at an elementary school in Pickering, Elaine entered the Royal Conservatory of Music in Toronto, where she has just spent two years in the study of organ, and comes to St. George's from the position of organist and choir director at Riverdale United Church.

She is now living in Georgetown, will continue her studies at the Conservatory, and plans to teach piano, organ and voice here in town. The congregation looks forward to her leadership in music.

Advertise 91% of tenders here - Levy

Town budget chief Harry Levy said he was sorry he missed council's discussion on tenders for the new fire truck last week because he differs with some of the opinions offered at the time.

Wednesday night Coun. Levy defended the town's purchasing procedures by saying the purchasing department tries to bring to town as much business as they can.

Of 23 recent tenders, 21 have been advertised in local newspapers for a 91 per cent "coverage" rate, which isn't bad, Coun. Levy said.

He said he doesn't believe that the same vehicle could be purchased for \$15,000 cheaper. Last time a vehicle was advertised for tendering, the same person who com-

plained regarding the fire truck didn't offer a tender, he said.

Many items are bought "en-masse" to save costs, Coun. Levy said. Treasurer Ray King added that sometimes the purchasing department doesn't know if there is a local supplier when they contemplate advertising.

Coun. Levy concluded his remarks by saying he hopes any gray areas surrounding local tenders can be clarified.

Realty office closes

Citing Canada's slumping economy as a general reason, Georgetown's Royal Trust Realty office will close this month after nine years of local service. Closing along with 40 other Royal Trust offices, Georgetown's 16 employees and sales staff may find new jobs with affiliates elsewhere. Royal Trust's Bramalea office will serve this area in the future.

Golf club levies

Members of the North Halton Golf and Country Club have been asked by their board of directors to help pay for damages caused by June's flooding of the club's fairways, ponds and watering system. The board hopes to recover the estimated \$60,000 to \$70,000 damage costs by assessing each member \$25 plus \$3 per month for the next year and additional charges, noting that no such special assessments have been necessary before.
