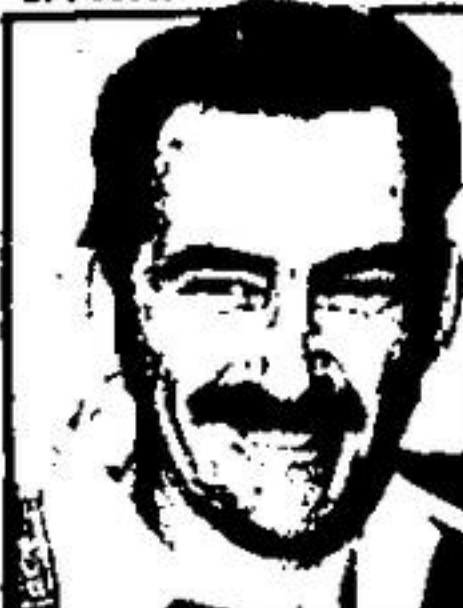
### CHARTER FLEET

Owner Wayne Andrews is a very knowledgeable fisherman whom I have known for many years. You can depend on him and his crew to supply you with a good day's fishing for the giants of the Lake.

### ANSWER YOUR LETTERS

A lot of enquiries are received about the fishing in Lake Ontario, some I receive by phone, others by mail. I do my best to answer all enquiries,

and a letter to The Herald is probably the best way to go.

This way I have time to get the best answer for you, although most times I have the information at hand.

Of course at this time of year, the queries are generally centred on salmon, then trout, and as the season progresses, how to get into the fall fishing for walleye, bass and muskie.

### MILLION DOLLAR

For the salmon in Lake Ontario especially the Million Dollar Coho on September 18, I would go with the best all round combo of green on green. This is a green dodger with a green fly on the trailer. Hence the name green (fly) on green (dodger).

This has proved to be the best, most consistent producer over the last few years, but always remember to experiment with other color combinations or even running a spoon, lure spinner clean, that is without a dodger ahead.

This is often the best way to pick up a chinook or brown trout. Combinations that have been working in the cold water of late are green on green, green on red, red on blue and blue on green, "clean"

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
