Mr. Barrager has not decided whether he will run locally or for regional council.

HASN'T MADE
Ed Wood, a former regional councillor for Acton who was defeated in his re-election bid in 1980 by Dave Whiting, said Monday he hasn't made any commitment to the race this year. If there is an announcement, he said, it will likely be made in October.

Ward 4 (Georgetown) councillors Harry Levy and Marilyn Serjeantson will also run again this year. With the exception of Roy Booth, George Malby and Walter Biehn, all incumbents have announced plans to seek re-election.
Coun. Serjeantson will be running for her fourth term in office. Most recently, she has guided

the development of a transportation system for physically disabled Halton Hills residents (ActiVan) and said she is pleased with council's past performance.
With the exception of one setback when he lost the mayor's race against Tom Hill in 1976, Coun. Levy has represented constituents in Georgetown since 1969. As the town's

finance committee chairman responsible for the

annual budgets, he has urged fiscal restraint.

Nominations for election close Oct. 15 at 5 p.m. Candidates can pick up nomination forms at the town clerk's office on Trafalgar Road and each candidate must have at least ten signatures from locally eligible voters to run for office.

Pam Sheldon enters fray

Speyside resident Pam Sheldon announced Monday she will seek a second term representing Esqueping residents on town council.

Actively involved with Halton board of education's "parent-volunteer program" and recently leading the Speyside Ratepayers Association protest against Standard Aggregates' quarry plans, Coun. Sheldon also chaired the town's official plan task force this year.

In a press release declaring her candidacy, Coun. Sheldon said aggregate issues and the official plan will continue to present important concerns for the next council, adding that she has gained valuable experience dealing with them in the past.

She applauded the town's ability to keep tax increases for its own use low, compared to hikes this year of 21 per cent for the Halton board of education and 28 per cent for Halton Region.
The town's "hard-

nosed" approach to financial management must be maintained, she said if the taxpayer is to be spared serious financial burdens.
While she used the town's rural roads program as an example of good long-term planning, Coun. Sheldon warned that it should not be "eroded due to unnecessary expenses in other areas".

Citizen of the Year seeks re-election

Chairman of the Halton Hills Hydro Commission, A.V. "Ab" Tennant, has announced his intention to stand for re-election as a

hydro commissioner in Ward 3, in the Nov. 8 election.

Mr. Tennant was a Commissioner of the former Georgetown Hydro Commission from 1976 to 1979 serving as chairman in 1978. He has been chairman of the new

Halton Hills Hydro Commission since its inception in September, 1979.

Mr. Tennant has contributed on a voluntary basis to many community organizations including Lions Club, Rotary Club, Georgetown Hospital (now finance chairman). He also served voluntarily as construction manager for the Halton Hills Library Cultural Centre, the Gordon Alcott Arena and the Georgetown Outdoor Swimming Pool. Mr. Tennant is the 1982 Georgetown Lions Club Citizen of the Year.

Chairman Tennant will not only lend an understanding of the community and its assets, but says "completion of the restructuring of the new Halton Hills Hydro Electric Commission presents a continuing challenge in the future, and I feel that my experience from both a practical and financial

standpoint will serve our 11,200 customers best interests."

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Worksharing at Uniglobe

The federal government has approved an application by Uniglobe Travel of Georgetown to put three employees on the government sponsored work-sharing program.

The department of employment and immigration, which approved the application, expects the move will avert one layoff at the Georgetown company.

Since the program was introduced last January, the department has approved 4,068 applications under the program to reduce the work week of 153,553 employees. The government claims the program has prevented 63,794 layoffs.

However, to finance the program, the government has committed \$175.4 million for the balance of this year and another \$3.8 million into 1983.

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
