**Consolidation critical, Allison seeks hydro seat**

Looking forward to helping complete the consolidation of all Halton Hills hydroelectric services under one roof in Acton, Ward 2 commissioner Murt Allison has announced his candidacy for re-election.

Negotiations for the purchase of local Ontario Hydro assets were the most important and most difficult part of the amalgamation process that has brought hydro services in Acton, Georgetown and Esquesing together, Mr. Allison said.

The commission handled the amalgamation, he said, so that not only rural users benefit but so do all Halton Hills users in terms of the security and

reliability of future service.

Consolidation of the three services under one roof is the key to improved customer service and financial planning, Mr. Allison added.

A farm machinery dealer by trade, Mr. Allison now spends most of his time farming at RR1 Georgetown, where he lives. He is past president of the Georgetown Lions Club and a member of St. John's United Church.

**Ex-Georgetown mayor seeks hydro re-election**

Former Georgetown mayor W.R. (Bill) Smith, a 12-year veteran of local hydro affairs, has announced his intention to stand for re-election as Ward 4 hydro commissioner in the Nov. 8 municipal election.

Continued from page A1 ten years ago. Mr. McFarlane had been here only two years before he became involved with other Norvalites trying to stop the school board from closing the village's small school. A rally on the schoolgrounds one

night took a group of protesting villagers to that evening's school board meeting in Burlington, among them Mr. McFarlane and Julian Reed, making his political debut just before he became Halton-Burlington's MPP. "It was an insult to the

community," Mr. McFarlane says of the Norval school issue. "We felt it was perpetrated and not really announced, so it was engineered. And it was something (the closure) we felt was not really necessary."

The board, however, was successful in its bid to close the school, citing its redundancy and high maintenance cost.

School board incumbents Arlene Bruce (Ward 1) and Betty Fisher (Wards 3 and 4), will seek re-election Nov. 8, as will separate school trustee Irene Macaulay. No other candidates have come forward.
