

#### INNOVATIONS ON DISPLAY

The Metro Bus and its Toronto driver, Gord Crosby, visited Halton Hills Sunday, but thankfully it wasn't an emergency visit. If it had been, "Emergency Support System Five", as it's also known, could have accommodated ten patients on stretchers for fast transportation to emergency disaster crisis centres for immediate treatment. Instead, local emergency workers and members of the public were relieved to view the bus during a non-crisis time, knowing it's available if ever needed.



Known as "Bandage One", this helicopter is a flying intensive care unit that was on display at the Georgetown hospital grounds Sunday as part of the Georgetown Volunteer Ambulance Service open house. It features a cardiac monitor, suction devices and medicine and carries up to two stretcher patients or six passengers plus the crew for evacuation purposes. Open house guests who poked their heads inside the chopper learned that it's staffed by five full-time paramedics and four full-time pilots working on rotation.

ance minister." The exchange trip is not being funded by taxpayers, Mr. McDermid pointed out. He said the visit is being paid for by independent sources, notably industry.

"When we're so closely tied to the U.S. on a financial basis it's most important that we have this liaison," Mr. Mc-Dermid said, noting that 70 per cent of Canadian exports go to the U.S.

The visit is organized under the auspices of the Canada-U.S. Legislative Visits Programme, established ten years ago in the belief that Canada and the U.S. face common problems and that the experience in one may be useful to the other.

"Right now, we're very concerned in Canada with the unemployment situation," Mr. McDermid said.

"The government is backed in a corner. There are a tremendous number people unemployed

now and they're trying to help the core unemployed yet not get into deficit financing."



## J.W. Thompson, former court clerk

A World War I veteran and former Halton county court clerk, James Wallace Thompson died Sept. 14 at Georgetown District Memorial Hospital. He WAS 86.

Born in Georgetown in 1897 to William Thompson and Jennie Willis, he was educated at Georgetown public and high schools. He entered the Merchants Bank, then a short time later the Bank of Montreal, and was transferred to Clarkson.

Mr. Thompson enlisted in the 67th University of Toronto Battery and went overseas during World War I. Upon his return in 1919, he was again posted

at Georgetown's Bank of Montreal branch before transfers to Woodstock and Preston.

He was connected with Thompson Hardware when he returned to Georgetown in September. 1923, and later Provincial Papers and Hewson Motors. He was appointed clerk of the third division Halton county court in

Long associated with St. George's Anglican Church in Georgetown, Mr. Thompson was vestry clerk for 30 years and auditor for 35 years. He served as treasurer of Branch 120, Royal Canadian Legion, for 22 years, its

secretary for 12 years and its Poppy Fund chairman for 24 years. He was a life member of

Branch 120 as well as Credit Lodge A.F. and A.M. Mr. Thompson leaves his wife, Jennie Irene (Huffman), sister Ethel

Wheatley of Aylmer and brother Herbert E. Thompson of Burlington. He rested at McClure-Jones Funeral Home in Georgetown prior to a

service at St. George's and interment at Greenwood Cemetery. His family asked that donations be made to the Canadian Cancer Society in his memory.
