Don't hesitate to head for shore and never venture out further than is sensible for the size of your boat. blow of losing so much. Two thousand dollars worth of gear will take a

while to replace, but lives cannot be replaced. There are a great many stories that could be told of that day, and many people asked the value of such a high prize for a single fish.
