## Duplicate bridge

Today's hand, played by the members of the Georgetown Bridge Club last week, can be termed a monster. Not a monster of the "terrible" variety but a monster number of points for the North-South DELITS.

This hand, depending on the pairs playing it, should be in 7 of something as there happens to be no less than 19 tricks for the taking. Any fool could play this you say. This is true.

However, only one contract will win the most marbles for the northsouth pair. Which one?

Search out a partner and try to bid to the best spot. It's not as easy as one first might think. This is the hand:

THE HAND:

Bd. No. 6 Dealer E Vul E-W

> S-KQJ10874 H-A976 C-A

S-53 S-962 H-J52 H-Q10843 D-9732 C-Q754 C-J863

> S-A **D-AKQJ1085** C-K1092

THE ANALYSIS:

With 17 tricks available for the taking, most pairs should be able to get to the seven level. South, with at least 41/2 losers and only a minor suit should open 1D not a forcing two-bid.

North, with only 5 losers in his hand, should jump shift to 2 S. From this point on if

either North or South takes charge, the hand is a perfect one for Blackwood. Whichever partner bids 4 NT will discover the two hands hold all four aces. He may then bid 5 NT (which, incidentally, guarantees all the aces are held) and discover that the partnership holds all the

At this time either North or South can count at least 13 tricks and should bid 7 NT. There are two entries to each hand and a careless, hasty declarer could block himself.
