Rug hooking show continues

The Georgetown Rug Hooking Guild exhibit of hooked art continues during library hours in the art gallery of the Cultural Centre through Saturday.

Unlike modern latchet hooking which utilizes precut yarn knotted and pulled through large gauge mesh with a levered hook, the centuriesold art of rug hooking uses jute burlap backing and one-sixteenth to one quarter inch continuous strips of hand-dyed wool flannel.

These strips are pulled through the burlap with a

special book to form firm, even loops. Colors are obtained by dyeing the wool fabric in gradation shades of colors obtained from synthetic dyes or from natural dyes from local weeds, flowers. leaves, barks, or roots and even onion skins.

The Georgetown dis-play features all local artists' works - from antique primitives, to beginners' works, through to advanced oriental rugs and pictorials. Whether commercially stamped patterns or originally drawn designs on burlap are used it is evident that color planning and design

play an important part in the finished work of art.




