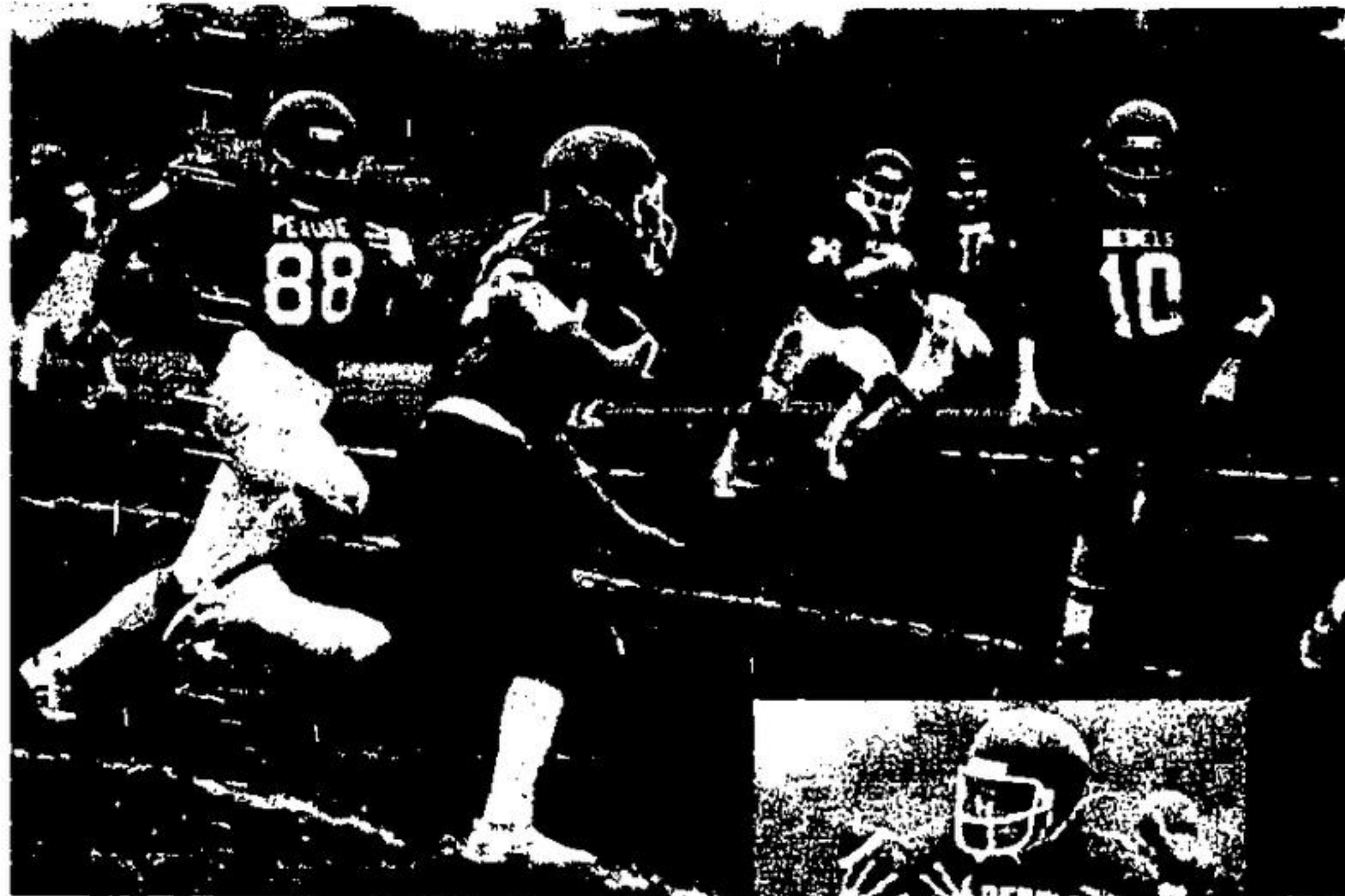
However, Georgetown's defense played well overall, and they began to tighten up near
