**Philharmonic percussionist shares his noisy secrets at Elliott Theatre**

**Shake, smash or rub 'em**

Shake, strike and rub: they're the three ways of producing sound from percussion instruments.

Bearing a collection of drums, tambourines, rattles, castanets, and keyboard instruments, the Hamilton Philharmonic Orchestra's percussionist, Jean-Norman Iadaluca, visited the Halton Hills Library and Cultural Centre last Wednesday night. He was in Georgetown to destroy the misconception that playing a percussion instrument is a cinch and doesn't take much musical talent.

With the Hamilton orchestra for his 12th season, Mr. Iadaluca said he's one of 32 resident musicians. He started playing drums when he was 15 and got into bands as most young people do. However, unlike most young people, he persisted at honing his musical skills with private lessons and eventually was accepted by the Montreal Conservatory of Music, where he studied for six years.

A May graduation was followed by a June audition and a job with the Hamilton Philharmonic in September.

Smashed pop can painted black and filled with dried rice, Mr. Iadaluca said that some instruments the orchestra buys, and some it makes. Shaking the dried rice in the tin makes for a soft sound, he said. Among the purchased instruments are tambourines.

**SHAKING IT**  
You'd think that playing a tambourine would merely involve shaking it. Not so, Mr. Iadaluca proved. With his thumb, he rubbed along the edge of the tambourine's back to make a very soft rolling sound. Then he put it on his knee, which was resting on a chair, and used his fist to get a faster rhythm.

Moving to the snare drums, Mr. Iadaluca said there are 26 ways of striking them. Built of fiberglass or brass, the wires underneath the drum give it its distinctive sound. Snare drums with wires made of cat gut or nylon are used when a dark rich sound is desired. Snares made of metal are used for delicate passages, he said.

"A lot of people ask me, 'Why do you lift your sticks so much when you play the drums?' They think it's done for show," Mr. Iadaluca said. "It's done for the sound. Also, it

makes it easier when we're playing fast because it makes the stick come back up on its own."

Drummers don't want to work at bringing the stick down and up, especially since there's a lot of energy coming back with the stick after it strikes.

**BRING DOWN**  
"I work to bring it down, and the drum brings it back up," he said.

A lot of people think that playing the drums merely involves hitting them. Mr. Iadaluca said there was a lot more skill involved, and proceeded to play along with a musical recording from the children's story "Peter and the Wolf".

To play softly, you play at the edge of the drum, he said. The edge of the instrument hasn't as much sound, but it gives the quality of distance, Mr.

Iadaluca noted. It's used when musicians want to give the impression of something taking place far away, like a parade.

Unlike the snare drum, which has no pitch, the kettle drum plays an octave. There are usually four of them in the orchestra ranging from 25 to 35-inch drums. The bigger the instrument, the lower the range, Mr. Iadaluca said.

What are drummers looking for when they have their face down by the head of the drum? Mr. Iadaluca said they're tuning their drum.

"When the other players are playing I can't tune very loudly, so I have to get my ear close to the drum head and just flick with a finger softly to test the pitch," he said. "If you sing the pitch into the drum it will vibrate

sympathetically." Sympathetic refers to sounds produced by responsive vibrations.

Moving over to the keyboard instruments, Mr. Iadaluca said the xylophone is usually used for very fast, rhythmic and flowing passages. Percussionists using the keyboard instrument can, by waving their hand over the instrument as the note

is played, make the sound resonate longer and thereby give more depth to the note.

Last Wednesday's talk and demonstration was one of six being hosted in Georgetown by the Hamilton Philharmonic Orchestra. The Opus Quartet is due in at the Elliott Theatre Oct. 20, followed by the Sentiri Quintet Nov. 24.

4. Revise the Environment Assessment Act so that it applies only to major developments.
5. Take a close look at the concept of sunset laws in the Province of Ontario. They should be introduced at both the provincial and federal levels to continually monitor the effectiveness of and the need for administrative tribunals.
6. Currently existing statutes should be reviewed constantly and some recast in "layman's" English. Sunset laws providing an ongoing review will allow easier repeal of unnecessary and redundant legislation.
7. Take an honest look at rent controls. Whatever the original cause and whatever the short-term benefits, rent controls are indefensible on social and economic grounds today. Get rid of them!
8. Industry interest groups, such as ours, and individual citizens are often available to contribute expertise and practical experience. We believe that the government should study various ways of involving such groups before the planning of

legislation has gone too far. Let such groups get in "on the ground floor" of the planning process. This, we believe, will eliminate "tunnel-vision" legislation and patchwork planning.

- LOSING GROUND:**  
Recommendations to the General Public
1. Be aware of your rights as property owners. And be especially aware of the restrictions placed upon those rights. Your home is not necessarily your castle to do with as you please.
  2. Question the need for unnecessary or redundant legislation. Find out why such laws are still on the books.
  3. Don't always expect the "public good" to overwhelm private interests. You will pay when it does, either through increased taxes or in the loss of yet some more rights.
