Visit 'Makers' at House Sol

Drawing from a wealth of youthful talent, Georgetown's Gallery House Sol next month hosts one of two group shows being held in Ontario to showcase the collective work of "Makers", 14 professional craftsmen who pursue a common interest in alternative lifestyle in Owen Sound.

Several members of the group will be on hand at

the Charles Street gallery this Saturday afternoon to help launch the three-week show. Outside of Makers' own self-titled shop in Owen Sound, the members' work will only be seen together on exhibition at House Sol and at the Tom Thomson Memorial Gallery in Owen Sound. Otherwise, individual members will enjoy a host of solo shows.

Among the works going on show at House Sol:

Joan Hawksbridge's drawings, a natural extension of her work in fibre arts; Jim Sebesta's widely varied prints, investigating texture as well as form; Tony and Gayle Clennel's Glenson Brook Pottery, all pleasing, functional stoneware; Tom Carnahan's wood-working, featuring innova-

tive, geometric designs.

Of special interest to Halton Hills residents will be the hand-made brooms of Bob Lyons, a former Georgetown resident who says his ambition is to make "a broom with love in it". He's been doing just that for ten years, inspired by symbols and traditional techniques.

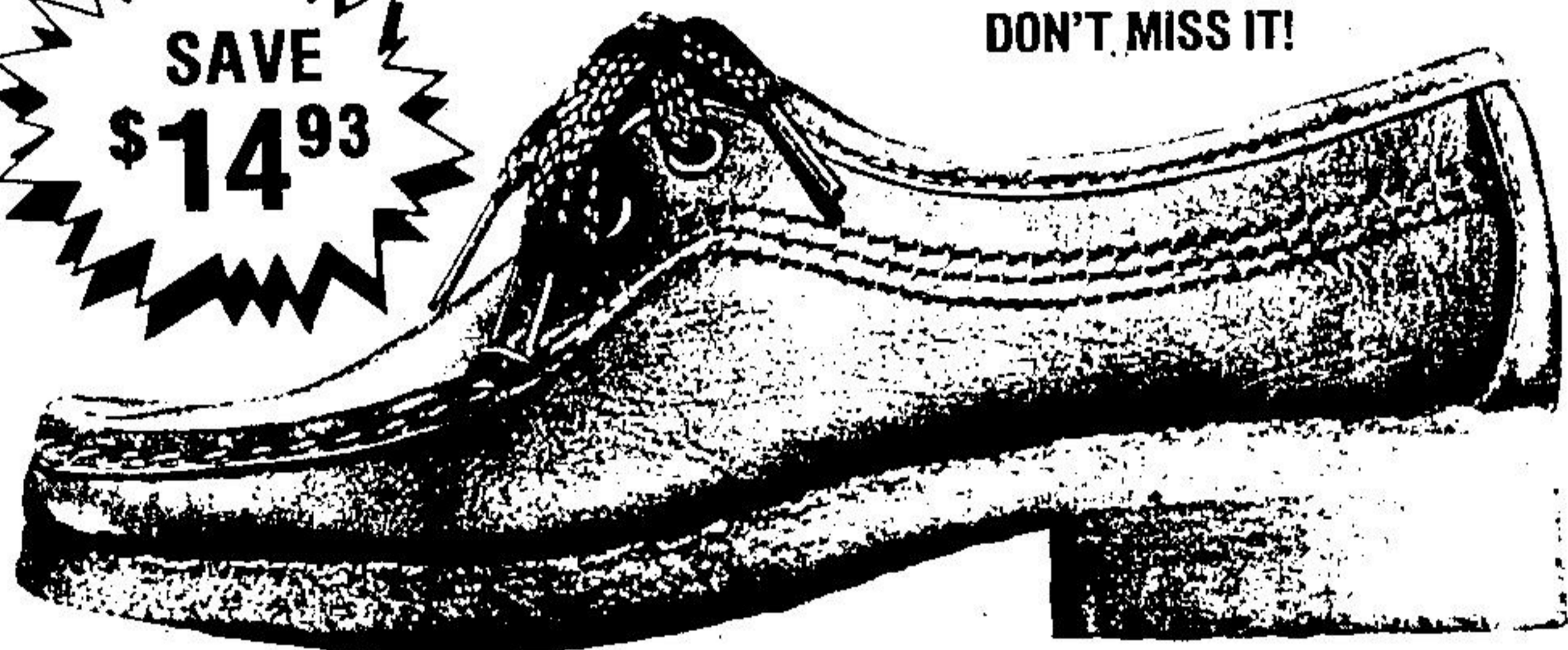
