
It was decided to approach the council for a tax exemption and much valuable advice was given by an associate member,

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


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NHAMR review

North Halton Association for the Mentally Retarded will undertake a major financial review this fall to determine how to offset a \$38,000 shortfall in provincial subsidies. The board of directors was informed at its summer meeting that ARC Industries revenue, a regional grant and other sources of income make up only \$190,370 of the \$600,240 needed this year. The province has approved a \$372,000 subsidy, about 68 per cent of the amount requested by the NHAMR. Campaign leaders are now being sought to help run the 1983 spring fun-raising campaign.

McHappy Days was another big campaign fund booster, according to the North Halton Association for the Mentally Retarded. The McDonald's Restaurants in Georgetown and Milton raised \$1,458 during the special day when local celebrities pitched in to serve up the Big Macs. 
