Four local runners competed Sunday in the Springbank International Road Race in London with good results.

The event, which was held at Springbank Park, is one of the fastest on the North American continent and included teams from Japan, Great Britain and the United States.

The race is internationally known and qualifying times were necessary in order to compete.

All four Georgetown runners, coached by Brian Barnes contributed towards the first place finish of their Scarborough Optimist Club.

In the open high school boys race containing

some 300 runners, Scott Harris placed 50th timing 15:28 over the 3.1 mile course. Harris commented that it was the "fastest high school start of any race" he'd ever seen.

He added that even though he sprinted the first quarter mile, he was still unable to stay with the foremost runners.

Sixteen year old Lynn Macphall placed 14th overall in the open women's division of 160 competitors. In addition, she was the first high school runner in and timed an impressive 26:04 on the 4.3 mile course.

The previous day she placed fifth in the junior girls division at the York University cross country meet.

Sandra Marciniuk who placed sixth in the senior girls race at York University, finished the Springbank race in 26th position overall in the open women's division. She was the sixth high school runner to finish clocking 27:10.

In a race of approximately 300 runners Jim Allan finished the open men's event in 62nd place timing 22:26. Chris Brewster of the University of Michigan (formerly of London Catholic Central) won the 4.3 mile race in a time of 19:51.
