LOOKING SHARP

The Georgetown Chrysler Raiders outdistanced what they thought would be the league's terror, Durham 9-2, then took on the up-and-coming Midland Athletics for a 8-4 romp over the weekend.

In Friday night's home game match-up, the Raiders managed a 3-1 lead over Durham in the first period, then picked apart their opponents' defence for 68 shots on the net.

Player-coach Gary Ford said after the game that the score might have been 9-8 for Georgetown if netminder Brad Miller hadn't been so sharp in net.

Miller's goaltending partner Doug Dragasovich was back in his first game since training camp ended.

Miller faced 14 shots in the contest. Coach Ford was pleased with the win, especially because everyone tried hard. However, the Raiders didn't play enough like a team and everyone tried to do the job themselves, Ford said.

General manager Don Fendley said he wasn't happy with a second period lapse when only two goals were scored, but the Raiders are starting to think tenwork overall.

"It was a little scramble, but the different units seem to be playing well together," he said.

Rick Daigle is playing better in every game," he said. Rick Daigle and Gary Ford paced the Durham game with two goals each.

In the first period Glenn Murray put Georgetown on the scoreboard with a goal from John Saunders and Guy Cormier.

Linemate Steve Bronzowski followed with a goal from Murray and Cormier. Rick Daigle scored the first of his two goals with two minutes remaining in the first period.

Bruce Ellison found the opening for a goal in the second period off a pass by Gary Ford. Then while killing a power play attempt, Guy Cormier advanced the score to 6-1 from Glenn Murray.

Rick Daigle put Georgetown further ahead on a goal scored from the slot on a well-placed rebound. Ron Twiss and Gerry Schaeffer helped out on the goal.

Coach Gary Ford showed a good third period example by scoring the last two goals, the first one shorthanded from Bruce Ellison.

The last Ford goal came with three minutes remaining from John Saunders and Bruce Ellison.

Jim Roberts of Durham scored the lone third period goal for his team. The tall and husky forward-defenceman is a former NHL player who is now the player-coach for Durham.

'Oktoberfest' to GDHS

The Georgetown cross country team won the Oktoberfest Invitational in Kitchener last Friday for its third straight year of attending the meet.

The site of the meet was the Chicopee Ski Resort and the surrounding terrain was put to full use.

The courses at Oktoberfest are classic themselves, as all six divisions of competitors were required to run up an extremely long and incredibly steep ski hill as part of their course.

The end of the race had runners coming down part of the same enormous hill, turning 180 degrees and ascending part of the hill a second time, turning again for the rest of the descent down the hill, a sharp 90 degree turn to the right at the foot of the hill and a slight uphill grade to the finish line.

The courses took the runners on roads, through fields, along bicycle paths, up and down ski trails and through the woods.

On some courses, runners had to go through a space of about two and a half feet between the ground and the bottom of a fence while going uphill through the woods.

Approximately 1200 runners competed and an ambulance was present to assist those unable to complete the race due to fatigue and/or hyperventilation from attempting to ascend the ski hill.

More than ten runners required such assistance at some point throughout the day.

Georgetown did very well, claiming 15 of the 30 gold medallions awarded. In addition to the overall school trophy, the Rebels again claimed the plaques for the overall girls' and overall boys' categories.

THREE FIRSTS
Of the six divisions, Georgetown took three firsts, a second and two thirds.

The midget girls, midget boys, and senior girls all won their respective divisions, while the junior boys were second and the junior girls and senior boys teams both earned thirds, each of them only one point out of second place.

The midget girls destroyed all other competition in their division by scoring 31 points. The next closest team was second place St. Mary's who totalled 95. Nancy Mustard placed a strong fourth for Geor-

town in the race of 183 runners.

Also contributing towards the team's win was Amy Powers in sixth place, Anne Coughlan in tenth, and Sandy Heaton in eleventh.

Samantha Windsor and Tina Newman, both public school runners, did extremely well, finishing 16th and 17th respectively.

WOOD, BRAND 2nd, 3rd
The midget boys faced their biggest field of runners this season, as a stunning 296 competitors completed the race.

The Rebels did superbly, however, by winning with an outstanding score of 21 points. Stratford Central, in second place also had a low total, scoring 33.

Of the first nine runners in, four were from Georgetown.

Leading the team were Mike Wood and Pat Brand placing an excellent second and third respectively. Greg Mackenzie finished seventh and Darren Boudreau was ninth.

Lynn Macphail led the junior girls to their bronze medals, placing second in a race of 132 competitors. The team's third place

of 67 points was only one point short of second place St. Mary's and a mere seven points short of Waterloo's winning score of 60.

Fiona Heaton was the second Rebel runner to cross the line, in 10th position. Kelly Roe and Leslie Bick followed in positions of 27 and 28 respectively. Karen Pepper came in for 46th spot and Shawn Langdon came in close behind for 47th place.

Georgetown's junior boys picked up the silver medals in a tough division with 269 runners competing. The Rebels' score of 73 points was five points out of first place W.A. Porter's.

Erik Hopkins was the first Georgetown runner in, placing fourth. He was followed by Chris Ferguson, 15th, Paul Watts, 19th, Dave Banks, 35th and Bob Lovegrove, 45th.

KRISTENSEN FOURTH
Susan Kristensen led the senior girls to victory placing an excellent fourth. The team's low score of 40 points demolished Orangeville who finished second totalling 90 points.
