Better Business Bureau advice

Home furnaces need your attention

As brisk fall days herald the approach of winter, the wise resident who controls his or her own heating system should get a head start on fuel economy by preparing the home furnace for heavy duty work ahead, says Paul Tuz, president of the Better Business Bureau. Mr. Tuz suggests conducting a thorough furnace checkup before the first cold spell hits.

A furnace checkup can be a do-it-yourself project, but having the heating system checked by reliable technicians at the beginning of the heating season is a good investment. In either case, be sure the following steps are taken:

- 1) Turn on the furnace well in advance of anticipated need, so that any trouble can be detected and corrected in a leisurely manner that allows time for thoughtful selection of a competent repair company.
- 2) Check the air filters through which recirculated house air passes, and clean or replace them if they are loaded with dust or lint. Establish a schedule - every 30 days, for example - for washing permanent filters or replacing disposable ones.
- 3) If the blower motor is of the type requiring oiling, put a few drops of oil in the oil cup at each end of the motor at the beginning of the season; reoil in January or February. With a hot water heating system it is necessary to oil the motor on the circulating pump located at the back of the heating boiler.
- 4) On gas or oil furnaces, examine the pipe (flue) to make sure it is in good condition and firmly in place. Rust spots on the pipe or rust streaks running down from the chimney indicate that the chimney may be plugged up. Old chimneys are susceptible to blockage by deteriorated mortar falling off the sides and filling the flue opening. These fragments must be removed by loosening the pipe and reaching into the opening.

**Using Expert Assistance:** The burning of fuel often produces ashes that interfere with good heat transfer. Further, burning fuel efficiently requires a specific quantity of air for optimal combustion. For these reasons, Mr. Tuz says that it's wise to have the heat exchange surfaces of the furnace cleaned periodically, and to have the air combustion rate checked or improved by service professionals. Oil burners, for example, work best if the air in the flue contains at least nine per cent carbon dioxide. A technician usually can tune up or adjust the burner to achieve better combustion rates that result in more efficient and less costly fuel consumption.

Studies have shown that many furnaces and boilers are oversized for the heating requirements of the houses they serve. A competent service technician, through a series of measurements and calculations, can make the furnace more energy efficient by reducing the fuel intake and modifying air-handling parts.

Having the service technician check and reset, if necessary, the on and off temperature settings on the furnace fan can conserve significant amounts of fuel. The fan should shut off when the furnace temperature is about 90F and should not go on again until the burner comes on and raises the furnace temperature to 110F.

**Repair Hacks:** Mr. Tuz says that fall is the prime time for bogus furnace repairs. Beware of itinerant men who canvass neighborhoods saying they are furnace inspectors. Someone unwise enough to let such people examine his or her furnace is likely to be told that there is a crack or other serious deficiency and is extremely dangerous. Often the scheme involves an accomplice, posing as a safety engineer, who recommends installation of a new furnace at once. Always check the reliability of heating repair companies by contacting the Better Business Bureau before signing a contract, paying out any money, or allowing the present furnace to be dismantled.

suffers migraines, Miss Dudley said.

"If you know you're prone to migraines, then you shouldn't go more than five hours between meals," she said, advising a snack before bedtime.

"Most people tend to think of it as a headache, but it isn't really," Miss Dudley explained. "Ask anybody who's had a God-awful hangover and multiply it by 100 and you have a low level migraine."

Cluster headaches are another type of migraine in which a person can go months or years between attacks, but once they start you can get one or more a day for weeks. You can't sit still with the pain and no medications can do you any good, Miss Dudley said.

"If you get migraines only twice a year, be grateful. It could be worse," she said. "It is one of the five worst pains known to mankind."

Besides taking drugs, a migraine sufferer should sit in a room without sound or light, with the head in an elevated position. Never lie flat, because then the blood will stay longer in your head and the pain take longer to go away.

Miss Dudley said 1982 has been the worst year

for migraines since 1878. The changes in weather have caused sufferers a lot of pain.

Weather is a very common trigger mechanism for migraines, Miss Dudley said. She said she had asked scientists at Environment Canada where in the world the barometer stays at a steady 30. She was told the middle of the Dead Sea or the bottom of the Grand Canyon. They're the two best places for migraine sufferers to holiday or take up permanent residence, she joked.

Miss Dudley is the executive vice president of the Migraine Foundation located at 390 Brunswick Ave. in Toronto. She founded the organization eight years ago.
