The funds for these projects were raised by Pieta Council at their weekly bingos held at Holy Cross Church on Thursday evenings. Since starting the charities fund in March of 1981, Pleta Council has dispersed a total of \$14,665 from this fund, exclusive of the committment to the hosp-

LEGION HISTORY The following year, 1937, Midget NHL hockey was organized by Gordon Alcott, and captured the

imagination of the local public like nothing had before or since.

Branch 120, along with with Lions Club and local industries each sponsored a team, Legion entry being the Canadiens. Interest was keenly shown in their proteges and in 1937 they won the league championship, and the "Stanley" Cup", donated by member John B. Kelly for annual competition.

Worthy of mention is the fact that two graduates of Little NHL went to big league hockey: Bob Goldham, Detroit NHL star, and Joe Schertzl in the American league.

All through these times, members mixed well with other Legions, visiting back and forth. Many friendships established then still exist in neighboring Legions.

Principal officers remained essentially the same during '37. Conditions in the community began improving and few of the members needed assistance or employment. Financially the club was in sound condition, but never showed much cash on hand as any money accumulated was immediately spent on improvements to the building as well as furnishings. At that time total worth of building and furnishings was estimated at \$2,000.
