Craftsmanship, the way it was

Jean Ruddell of Georgetown, a wellknown historian, was guest speaker at Limehouse Women's Institute meeting Oct. 7. A nice number were present in spite of inclement weath-

Miss Ruddell spoke about "Crafts Old and New", a subject on which she seemed well qualified to talk. She told us of the very primitive life of the pioneers, who had to make do with whatever was at hand, usually freshley fallen trees. Tools were also very few, and hinges and locks and very crude furniture were made from wood.

Animal hides covered beds, doors, windows, etc. Shingles for the homes were thick and maybe three feet long, so were

very heavy.

In time, clothes word beyond use, so were sewn into guilts, or cut into strips for mais, some oclors having been freshened by dyes, made from bark or weeds. The success of dying depended on the weather, season, etc.

Shredded corn husks or stuffed mattresses were braided into hats or mats.

Livestock became more plentiful and sheep especially valuable for clothing and meat. The speaker told us in detail of the wool industry, processing in the home from the fleece to the farmer's back. She then displayed a large number of items in the home, even those in use today, which are made from wool.

She had been introduced by Mrs. F.T.C. Brown and was thanked by Mrs.

President Mrs. Ander-

son had opened the meeting with a poem "It Couldn't Be Fall", and called on us for "We Cherish Our Organization" the Collect, and the Roll Call "The first craft I remember doing or bring one your grandmother

did." The motto "If anything is worth doing it is worth telling someone how to do it well," was carried off by Mrs. A.W. Benton.




Eighth break-in

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
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
