Preparations underway for Lions' Santa parade

It hardly seems fair to summer-lovers, but preparations are already well underway for the Georgetown Lions Club annual Santa Claus parade.

Parade committee chairman Steve Harlow thid The Herald last week he's lined up the first few entrants already for the Nov. 20 parade, for which more than 40 floats, bands and other entries are expected.

More "for the sake of change" than anything else, Mr. Harlow said, this year's Santa parade will make its way through, Georgetown in reverse direction from previous years. Entrants will line up on Sinclair Avenue formerly the finishing area - then parade down Guelph Street to Maple Avenue, parade left to Main Street and disband on James Street. Moore Park Plaza, previously the starting point, is not on this year's route.

Lion Fred Zorge will serve as parade marshall this year, leading a wide variety of four-wheeled and two-legged entries that will be decorated according to this year's theme "Storybook Characters".

Another change this will remove the Lions Club canvassers who used to "pass the hat" at curbside while the floats rolled by. Rather than soliciting funds from bystanders, Mr. Harlow said, the club is hoping Georgetown area merchants and industries will consider sponsoring the parade through donations to the parade fund.

Ex-mayor's plight prompts review

Mayor Pele Pomeroy assured a Princess Anne Drive (Georgetown) resident Monday night that he would ask the region to investigate an 18-year old legal problem concerning the resident's sewer book-

Former Georgetown mayor Wheldon "Steamer" Emmerson told council a saga of betreaucratic mismanagement which has limited access to his sewermain if it should

break down. After purchasing the Princess Anne house 18 years ago, he discovered that his sewer line was not hooked up and emptied under a vacant lot owned by the town. The town's works department at the time refused to move the sewermain hook-up to his property and instead connected it under the town-owned lot.

Mr. Emmerson said he was later granted an easement over the town property in order to maintain the pipe.

The easement was later successfully challenged by a neighbor who had purchased the town lot neighboring Mr. Emmerson's property. While the town's committee of adjustment recently allowed the neighbor to construct a carport near the sewer line, Mr. Emmerson said an additional structure has been added and further hinders access to the

Acton unveils 'Ciderfest' celebration

Acton businessmen are planning to hold a Leathertown Market and "Ciderfest" next summer and have been given permission to close off part of the community's Mill Street.

Noting that other southwestern Ontario town's have adopted "festival" themes to generate business and draw tourists, Actario chairman Ted Tyler told council Monday night he hopes the Acton event will be held annually after its inauguration around next Aug. 27.

Council agreed to close Mill Street East - actually a section of Highway 7 - diverting traffic along Bower Street or through Eastern and Church Streets. The closed section stretches west from the railway tracks to the intersection of Mill and Main Streets.

Mr. Tyler acknowledged that while organizers may not use all the street for the event, heavy truck traffic will be more easily handled on Bower and Church Streets, rather on some of the smaller arteries surrounding the down-
