## Look for a bad winter

Well, there you have it. The first snow of the winter. Fall actually, as winter is not officially or obviously here. But the overtures are there regardless of our wishing it would hold.

As I have been predicting all summer, we will have a fairly bad winter with plenty of snow cover. Let's just hope the ice forms fast and hard or we might have some bad ice conditions for that favorite winter sport, ice fishing.

If ice is good we can expect top rate fishing as there are plenty of fish and this goes for all legal species. Not every location will be good, however. Acton's Fairy Lake will not be very good this winter, as the pike did not spawn this spring, and the lake has seen a lot of motor boat traffic.

If motors were banned on Fairy Lake, and the lake was restocked with Bass and Pike, and the duck, goose and swan population was controlled, then this would be the high quality fishing spot it

used to be some years ago. Make sure you have a copy of the 1982-83 fishing regulations and keep tabs on open areas for winter fishing and make several trips this winter. You will not regret it I am sure.

LITLE CLEO Stock up on the Seneca Tackle company lure that goes under the name of LITTLE CLEO. This lure is a hot number for the splake in Owen Sound

harbor. As the season gets closer I will mention locations and tricks to take the species of fish that are resident there and in other areas. The big thing now is the fall lishery for salmon and trout. Once

again read up on the regulations and pick your spot. An excellent fall fishery is building, and lots of fish are being taken. Those fishermen who are hitting it big are not telling too much about their

luck but we will try to find out for you. What to do with all the fish you catch? If you are not in to catch and release fishing, then try it. If you don't catch enough to warrant this type of sportsmanship, then try smoking your catch.

Freezing fish is the most common method of keeping your catch over, but it's not the best Nothing compares to cooking fresh caught fish, but amoking comes next.

Smokers are cheap to build or they can be purchased at almost any fishing tackle store. The Little Chief is amongst the most worthy, and is readily available. Recipes come with the unit and I keep a large selection on hand if you ever need

At this time of the year fish can be readily taken on Jigs and this includes ALL species of game fish. As ice builds the tip-up or jigging stick comes into its own. I have been making a tip-up jigging stick and often sell a few. These are the best all round tool for the ice fisherman, and have been used for salmon and trout at the mouth of the Credit river in winter.


