

# GFFL season concludes with bang and wimper

The GFFL regular season ended this week with a bang for some teams and a wimper for others.

The Greeks Tavern made good on a pre-season prediction, putting their money where their mouth was, and gaining their first ever regular season championship, although it wasn't as easy as they expected.

# Bantams drop opener

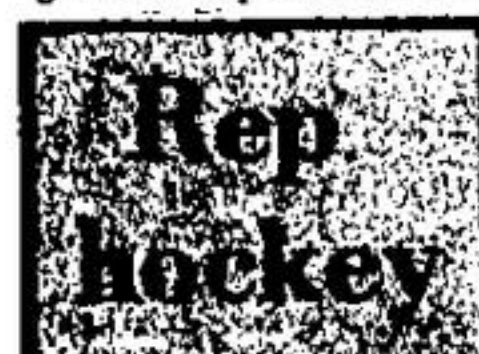
Georgetown Optimists' Minor Bantams opened their season with a 3-2 loss to Milton.
