Against Thornhill the Georgetown club were without five of their players and affiliate players from the GMHA midget team were called up to help.

BUFFALO
The Gemins played an exciting hockey game in Buffalo, New York Saturday which might have contributed to their sluggishness in their game the next day against Streetsville.

Georgetown led their Buffalo counterparts 3-2 after the second period, but three quick goals in the final period gave Buffalo a 6-3 win.

Gemini executive member Bob Tost says the Streetsville game wasn't as out of reach as the score indicates.

The Georgetown club stayed within distance of the Derbys in the first period, although they were outscored 3-0.

Now Dean is back talking with his hometown club and discussions were held on the weekend. Bob Tost is hopeful the former Miracle Mart all-star can be signed soon.

Local man bags moose

Remember Brent Hall, who took a spill in Lake Ontario during the Great Salmon Hunt? Maybe Brent's luck has turned.

He took a Bull Moose while on hunt in the Montreal River area of Wawa that measured 59 inches "green".

A drying period is usual before an official score or measure is taken, but that is a really large moose. Brent uses a Browning 308 with a Bushnell 1.5X4 variable scope. One shot took the prize and the team of four men took two bulls by 10 a.m. on opening day.

The first was Brent's - 1 1/2 hours into the season. Ted Martin and Stan Whitten are from Orangeville, Fred Perry is from Ottawa and along with Brent Hall of Glen Williams have been hunting as a team for the last ten years.

Team work is important in a hunt of this type and this team has proven its worth. Eight moose in ten years is as good a record as you could wish for.

I was asked the other day, what is the best method of taking fall walleyes. My answer is the one that works that particular day. That is not a "cop out" answer, but the only one that is reasonable.

Depending on the weather and the air and water temperature, the fish could be very shallow even in the daylight hours or down in forty feet of water. As mentioned here recently, a Rapala ice fishing jig, is a good tool to locate fish. As is any good jig tipped with a minnow. I prefer to use a GAFEN BAIT WALKER rig with a floating Rapala.

This rig will get the floater down to bottom and the floating effect will keep it out of weeds and rocks. This is a sure fire method and can be used from deep to shallow or reverse. The use of minnow or other bait enhances a jig but also puts it off balance to compensate for that.

Muskies are slow this fall, and the trout have not been taking the offerings of fishermen in the popular late season hot spots. There are plenty of trout in the Credit, but the SEASON IS CLOSED. It seems I have to keep mentioning this, as each day

and especially on the weekend, many fishermen are taking trout.

Only salmon are legal in the Credit River and anyone taking a fish out of season is liable to a fine of \$1,000 depending on the circumstances.
